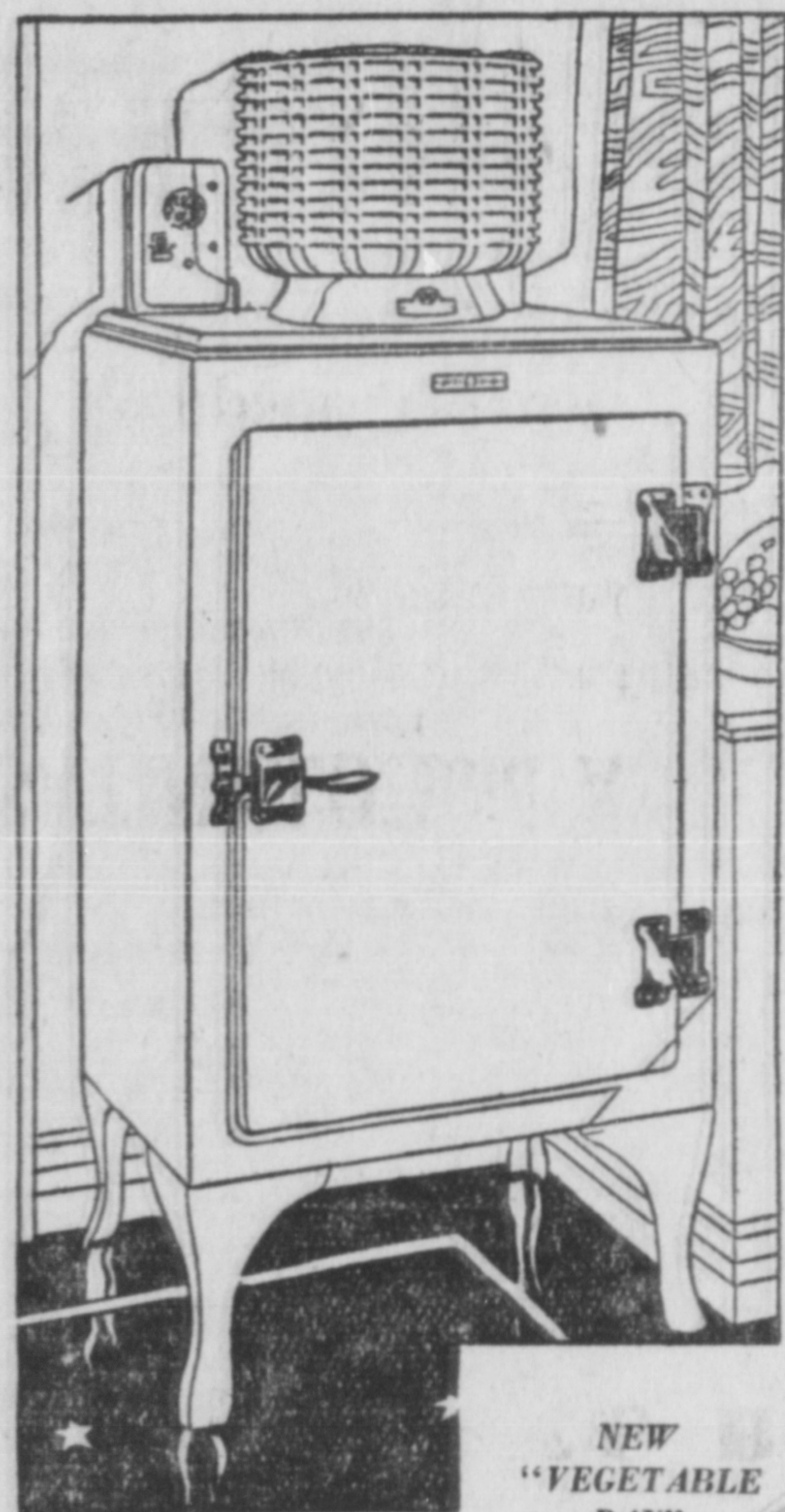

**INQUEST IS HELD**

Coroner's Jury Asks For Further Information to Determine If Dead Man Was Actually Larry Ward

After hearing evidence yesterday afternoon relating to the tragedy at Falls River on March 26 when four men were drowned from a sinking flat-bottomed skiff, the coroner's jury investigating the death of a person whose body was found floating in the entrance of the harbor Sunday afternoon and who is believed to have been Larry Ward, one of that unfortunate quartet, adjourned its session until this afternoon in the hope that in the interim a more definite identity may be established. Presumption that the body is that of Ward is based on the fact that the clothes it bore were similar to those that were worn by Ward who, like the corpse, had a gold tooth on the upper jaw.

The inquest opened at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon and, after the body had been viewed, hearing of evidence commenced. The inquest is being conducted by Coroner C. L. Monroe and Inspector William Spiller is acting for the provincial police with L. W. Patmore holding a watching brief for the Power Corporation of Canada, employer of the four men who lost their lives at Falls River. Constable J. H. Smith is taking a stenographic record of the evidence.

Witnesses heard yesterday were John William Eastwood of Digby Island, who discovered the body floating in the water; Constable Robert Gibson, who took the remains in charge after the discovery had been reported to the police; Gus Gustafson and Anders Anderson, who were in and escaped from the death boat at Falls River by swimming ashore; George Laroque, a witness of the fatality from the shore, and George Hurst, Power Corporation foreman, who was also an eye-witness of the drownings. Jack Selvig acted as Norwegian interpreter for Gustafson and Anderson.

**Boat Overloaded**

Gustafson and Anderson attributed the sinking of the skiff, which resulted in the drowning of the four men, to the fact that the fragile craft was overloaded, six men in all being in it. Anderson testified that the men were in turn rowing and paddling across the stream. The waves of the stream were coming over the side of the boat. He (Anderson) had not realized the danger of the situation until they were partly across and then it was too late to turn back.

It was after Anderson had given his evidence that J. A. Smith, one of the jurymen, pointed out that no evidence of a definite nature had been adduced to prove that the dead man had been Ward. Inspector Spiller stated that two or three men who had been close friends of Ward had viewed the remains but would go no further than to state that, judging from the general appearance of the clothes and stature of the body, they had an idea that it was Ward but were not prepared to positively identify the body. There seemed to be little hope of any more definite identification.

Mr. Patmore pointed out that the members of the jury could hardly be asked to determine the identity of the body when close friends of Ward were unable to do so. No evidence had been adduced, in fact, to show whether the body was that of man or woman.

**Hearing Adjourned**

Joseph Brown, foreman, announced that the jury had decided that it was advisable to have the body examined by a doctor to ascertain whether it was that of man or woman and to find, if possible, any further marks thereon that might lead to identification.

The inquest was then adjourned until 2 o'clock this afternoon. The jury consisted of S. E. Parker, John McRae, Joseph Brown, J. A. Smith, G. M. Hunt and Frank Dibb.

**Baptism Service at Kispiox Was Held on Sunday**

HAZELTON, May 7:—On Sunday afternoon last, Rev. T. H. Wright of Hazelton officiated at a very interesting baptismal service in the Kispiox native church. Miss Jean Burns of New Hazelton sang an appropriate solo "In the Garden." The baptismal service was followed by Holy Communion in administering of which Rev. A. A. Burnett assisted the officiating minister.
