"SPITE FENCES" EXIST IS SUGGESTION MADE

Discussion on Alderman Perry's Fence Amendment Takes Funny Turn.

On Ald. Perry bringing in an amendment to the fence section in the city bylaws, Ald. McRae informed him that the Board of Works already had some new regulations in view, especially regarding garage construction. They were now obtaining advice from the underwriters and other cities on these questions and he suggested that the regulation of the fence bylaw be left to be dea. with along with these others. Alderman Perry said that he was quite willing to have it dealt with in this way.

There was considerable discussion on the matter, suggesting spite fences and neighborly disputes. Ald. Kirkpatrick asked why a person could build a house over six feet high if they could not build a fence any higher. Mayor McClymont replied that sometimes fences were built for other, reasons than use, but houses cost too much to be built for spite. Fences sufficient to keep people from looking into their neighbor's back yards would have to be perhaps fifteen or twenty feet high and very amusing looking structures.
