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#### TOLMIE'S VICTORY

Premier Tolmie seems to have won at least a temporary victory at the annual meeting of the B. C. Conservative Association at Nanaimo. There was no open rebellion at the meeting although there was said to be plenty of rumbling in the corridors of the convention hall.

To his opponents the Premier spoke very plainly. He told how he had been pressed into the service of the party at the Kamloops convention, how he had given up his Ottawa career to come to the rescue of his party in British Columbia and lead them to victory. Then he dared them openly and told them he would carry on until the time arrived for another election when they could choose any other person they wished to lead them.

It seems clear that Dr. Tolmie came out a winner and that his stock has gone up since the time of the convention. While he said this was no time for an election he did not commit himself except to say that the government still had two years during which it might continue to carry on. In spite of this the opinion still prevails that if terms can be arranged for anything like a satisfactory disposal of the P. G. E. in the near future, the government will then ask the people of the province to endorse or reject the scheme. That it would have a strong appeal in the south is expected but whether it could overcome the growing opposition to the government is another matter. Many think it could not. Much will depend upon the happenings of the next few months. The electorate is fickle at all times and no one can forecast with any degree of certainty what people will do.
