SOLDIERS' VOTING QUESTION AGAIN

Letter From Col. Peck was Read
At the Council Meeting
Last Night.

At the council meeting last night a letter was read from Col. G. W. Peck, V. C., M. P., regarding the voting of returned men at municipal elections. Col. Peck felt that all men who had served with the expeditionary forces in France, England or Canada should be entitled to vote and that their discharge certificates should be sufficient to get them on the lists.

The mayor said that this was a matter that was regulated by the legislature and the proper way to have it adjusted would be to take it up with the Union of B. C. Municipalities who could recommend amendment to the Provincial Government.

CITY BONDS ARE NOT POPULAR INVESTMENT

Default of Saskatchewan City
Hurt City Bonds Generally.

At last night's City Council meeting a letter was read from the Spitzer, Rorick Stock and Bond Co., of Toledo, Ohio, the firm that in the past has floated many of Prince Rupert's bond issues. The American company reported that the bond market was very quiet and that Canadian municipal bonds were selling very slowly at the present time and the default of Prince Albert on its bonds had done a lot to hurt the selling of all Canadian city bonds.

Canadian federal bonds were offering at 6 per cent interest and provincial bonds 6½ per cent so it could be seen that there would be difficulty handling city bonds at the same rate or less. Prince Rupert's new bonds will offer 6 per cent. The company evinced interest in the bylaw elections and wished to know the result.

The mayor said that it was a very desirable thing that the people should know through the medium of the press that it was no simple matter to sell municipal bonds just now. At the same time Prince Rupert did not intend to sacrifice its bonds although they were not just the most popular form of investment at the present time.

HAPPY GATHERING IN DOWNTOWN HOTEL
