



It was not the people who have indulged in the excessive buying due to good times; on the contificially stimulated by big business, the high pressure salesmanship and extensive advertisements that have capiltalistic prosperity, was designed and did benefit big business at the expense of the ordinary people resulting in accumulation of additional and surplus wealth in the hands of big business while people, especially the unemployed section of them, haven't got enough to eat. This prosperity coming to its natural end was another contributory factor for present depression.

But I fail to understand that the could be caused by failure on the part of the people to meet payments due on the articles bought on time. especially, as the articles enumerated, with the exception of cars, are not the bulk of business transact-

On the other hand, it is undeniable that this discontinuation of payment by the people is reacting on the general business and in turn aggravates the stagnation.

However, the business depression has got to occur first and then becomes the very cause of the failures. To establish validity of the above contention it is necessary to analyze the business cycle in the light of its motive force. This motive force is the economic necessity at present, having been naturally evolved in the process of evolution of human society, without any interference on the part of imaginary devils, or gods, or deliberate plans on the part of capitalists, but blundered into by the same humans while in the struggle for existence, each one occupying oneself, in an endeavor to satisfy one's biological
