After Smith had saved Williams' hot drive, Horner added the fourth for Anyox and Dixon made the fifth from off side. A. Dickens scored Prince Rupert's third goal. Smith made a splendid one-handed save or it would have been 6 to 3.

The Prince Rupert team played as selected. The second game will be played tomorrow evening and the Prince Rupert team will then leave for home aboard the gasboat Laura F.

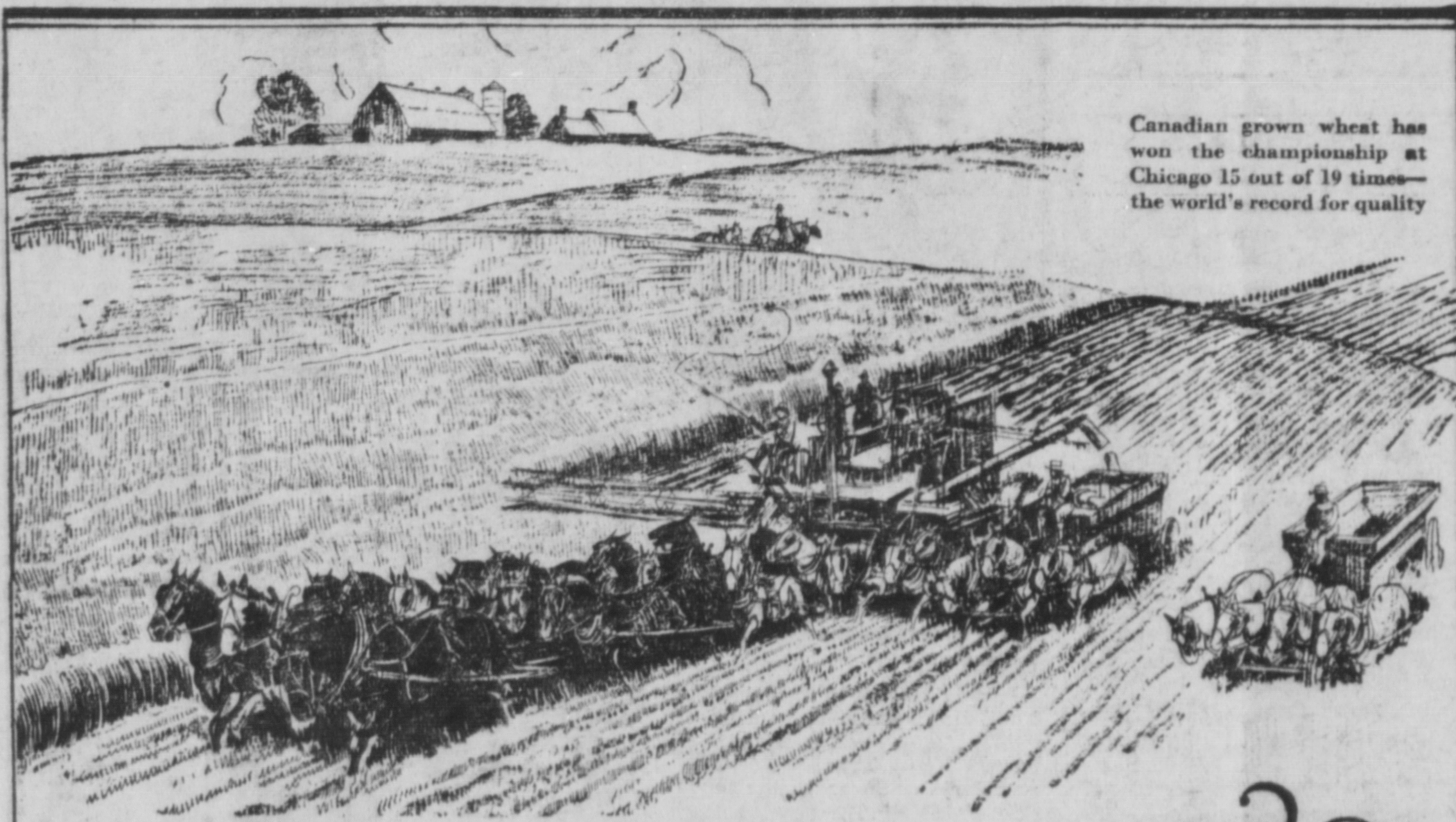

AROUND PRINCE RUPERT

Had Good Results Panning in Cariboo—Developing Metcalf Fendley Property at Stewart—Rich Gold Find in Northern B. C.

After spending three months in the Barkerville district working placer claims, Bernard and Eugene Smith, Do. Stanyer and Fred Stearns have returned to their homes at Burns Lake. While away they were able to pay their wages and make good wages and brought home a nice sack of dust with them. After spending a time at Burns Lake, the quartet plan on returning to the Cariboo country.

Alice Arm district was not able to collect enough ore specimens this year to make it worth while sending an exhibit to the Vancouver Exhibition. The few specimens that were assembled will be sent later to the British Columbia Chamber of Mines in Vancouver.

Harry Bowyer, who left Alice Arm recently on his return to Seattle after taking control of operations at the Esperanza Mine, expects to be back in Alice Arm again in the fall.

W. W. Metcalf, who is associated with C. L. Hibbard in the development of the Metcalf Fendley property on the northwest slope of Banded Mountain was in Stewart recently. When asked concerning developments at the property this year, Mr. Metcalf stated that the work which had been done having

disclosed the vein to be flatter than necessitated a change in program which, owing to the late season, has been postponed until next year.

M. C. Brown, Fairview, Alta., prospector, is reported to have discovered a mystery gold bearing 18 days foot northwest of Fort Graham in Northern British Columbia from which he received 27 ounces of coarse gold in three days, and three poles and his blanket and a rude rocker. This gave him a haul of \$180 per day for his haul. He is staking the claim at once.

Harry McKenzie, Vancouver prospector, who has been operating a plane for some time during the summer in the Rainbow Creek placer mining country, has returned to Vancouver. He reports a great deal of activity among placer miners of the creek.
