Making her final appearance of the season at this port, C. N. R. steamer Prince Henry, Capt. Harry Nedden, arrived in port at 7 o'clock this morning from Skagway and other Alaska points and sailed at 9:30 a.m. for Vancouver direct.

Northland Navigation Co.'s motorship Norco, Capt. A. Fikholm, arrived in port at 8 o'clock last night from Ketchikan and, after discharging one carload of frozen fish for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways, sailed for Seattle.

The case of A. Donald, charged with keeping a gaming house at his Monte Carlo premises, as well as those of several men, charged with being inmates, were adjourned until Friday on coming up this morning in city police court.
