General Damaso Berenguer, who succeeded to the nominal premiership, restored freedom of speech and lightened censorship of the press. Republican and other leaders who had been exiled since 1923 came back and a flood of agitation against monarchial institutions was released. Strikes, student agitations and similar demonstrations flared up, and in December, 1930, there was an open attempt at revolution. The people finally spoke at the elections yesterday and Alfonso was wise enough to take them at their word. Continuation of his reign would, no doubt, have fomented further revolt.

A monarch of great wealth, the marriage of King Alfonso to Prin-It cess Victoria of England was always described as a love affair. They have four sons and two daughters. Although beset by assassins and revolutions without, Alfonso has always been credited with making a real family life within the residential sections of his palace. As much simplicity as the royal station permitted was always the rule and never a day passed without Alfonso spending some time with his children.




