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DRY BASEMENT ADDS VALUABLE SPACE TO MODERN RESIDENCE

How to Prevent the Invasion of Moisture

IT costs much less to build a water-I tight wall than to repair a leaky one. Consequently, the time to make a basement water-tight is when it is built. Monolithic concrete foundations easily can be made watertight if the amount of mixing water used in making the concrete is carefully regulated. The recommend mix for water-tight concrete is one containing not over 61/2 gallons of water per sack of cement.

Concrete block and concrete building tile often are more convenient than monolithic concrete for the construction of foundation walls above grade and for walls enclosing basements. Plain, unsurfaced block or tile are used for walls . below grade. The units are laid-up quickly and economically and provide walls of great strength.

A line of concrete drain tile is placed entirely around the outside of the footing and is connnected to a suitable outlet. The excavation above the tile is filled with soil. cinders, or some other material of a porous nature to provide a fill that will allow water to seep through quickly. When the foundation is erected so near another building that it is impossible to run a line around the outside, the tile may be placed on inside of the

As a further precaution in securling a water-tight basement wall, two or more coats of portland cement plaster may be applied to the exterior surface as soon as wall forms are removed, or, in the case of a concrete block wall, just as soon as the mortar joints have hardened. The plaster is mixed in the proportions of one part cement to three parts sand. Before applying the plaster, the surface should be dampened evenly.

If basement space is to be utilized completely, it is well to furr the exterior walls on the inner surface should consist of two base coats. and apply a coating of portland each 3/8-inch thick, and a finish cement on metal lath. 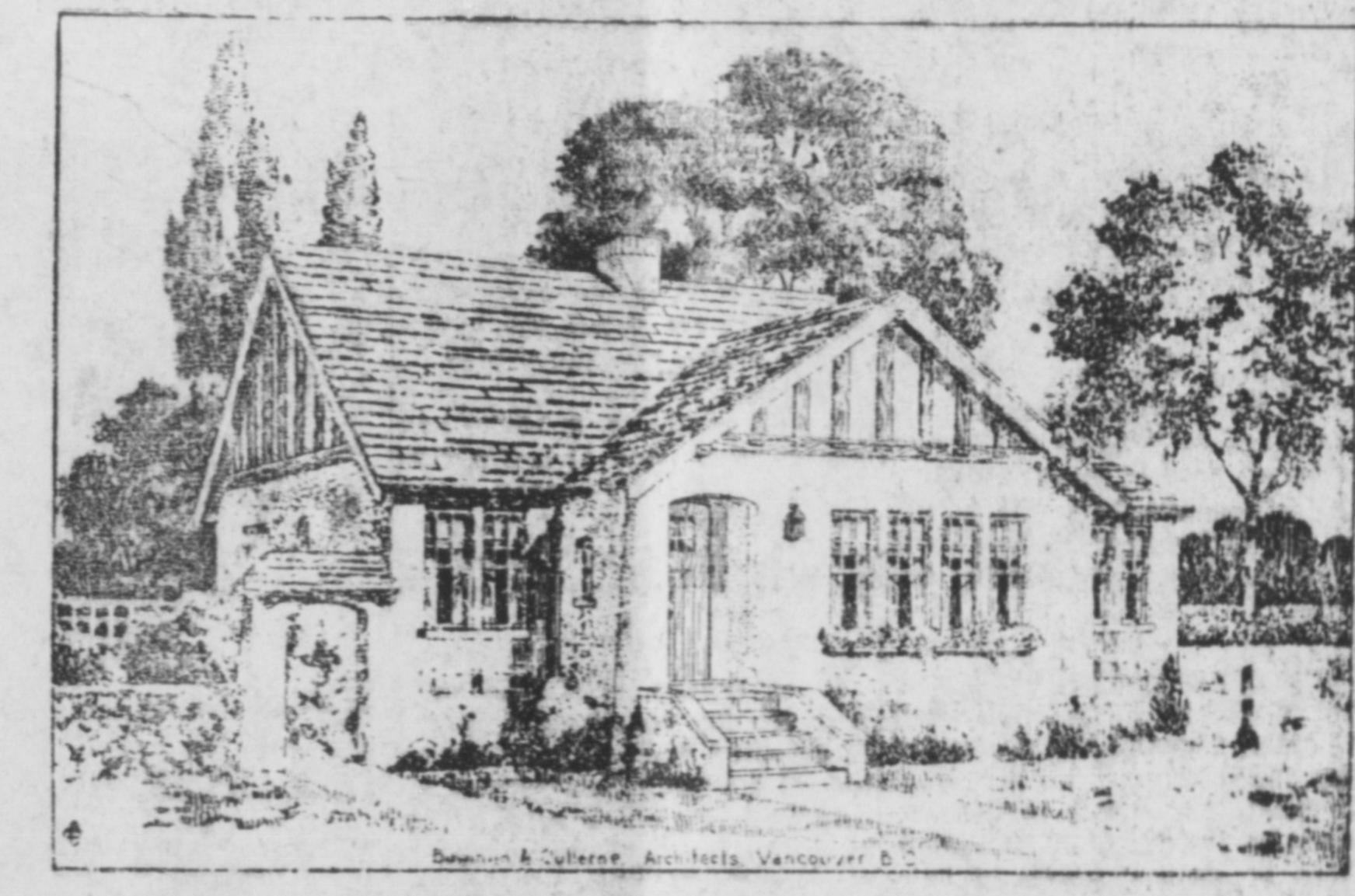

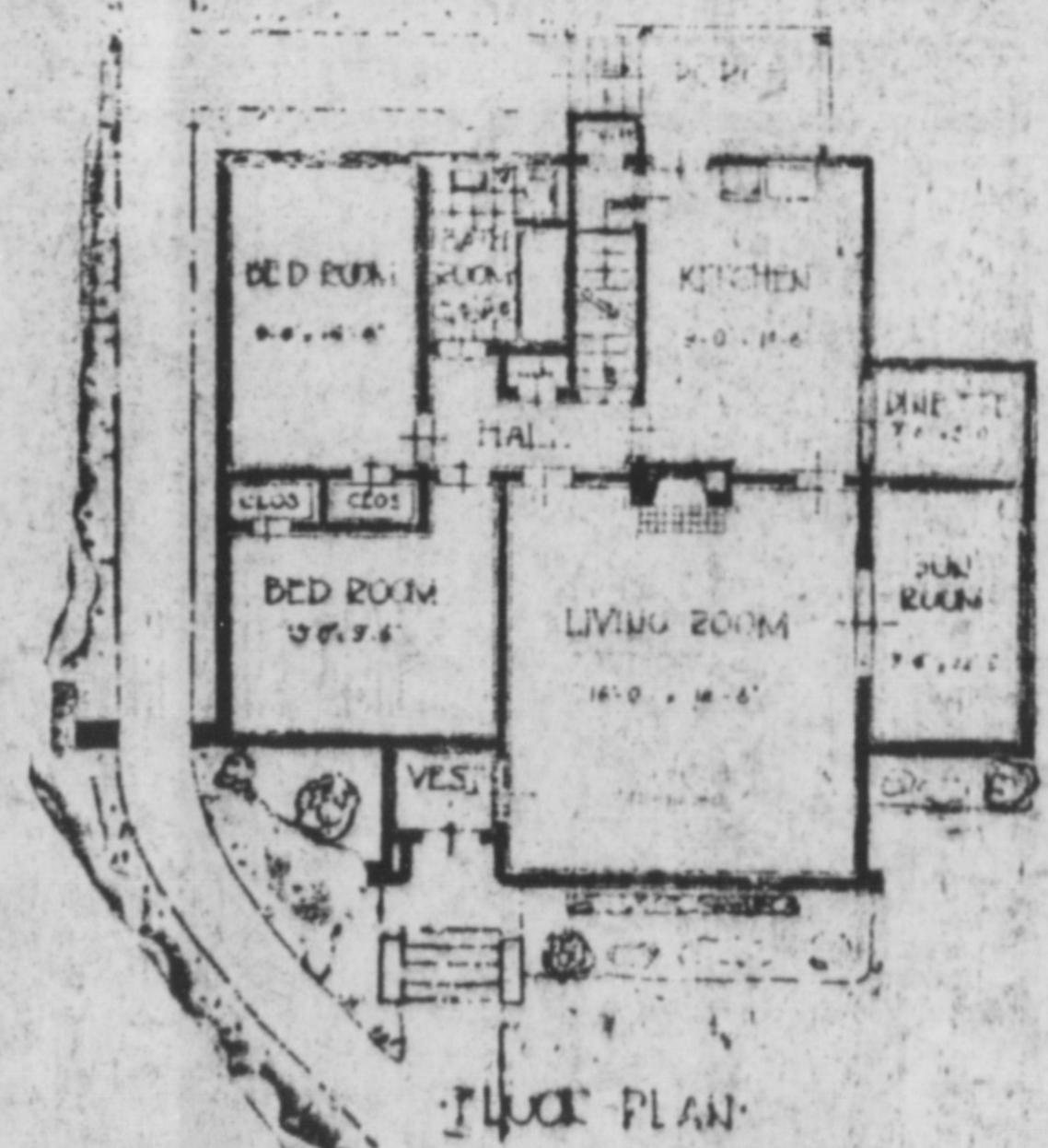
