"Across the Sea," was played last night by radio station KJR of Seattle for Capt. McIver of the local fishery patrol boat Metra which is now at sea.

Tenders from the Prince Rupert Supply Co. and Philpott & Evt on supply of pipe were opened at last night's meeting of the City Council and referred to the Board of Works with power to act.

The city council last night gave introductory readings to a bylaw providing for the temporary borrowing from the Royal Bank of Canada of the sum of \$100,000 pending the collection of the year's taxes.

At the meeting of the city council last night it was decided to send a night lettergram to Mayor Orme asking him to report on the unemployment relief situation at Ottawa so that the city might be kept informed as to the attitude of the government there in regard to the matter.

The city council last night gave introductory readings to a bylaw repealing a local improvement bylaw which had been previously passed to provide for a new sidewalk on the west side of Sixth Street from Third Avenue to Fraser Street on part of which D. Zarelli recently requested permission to build a concrete sidewalk.

Union steamer, Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, returned to port at 10:15 this morning from Anyox. Stewart and other northern points and sailed at 1:30 this afternoon for the south.

The regular monthly business luncheon of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club was held today in the Commodore Cafe. President C. C. Mills was in the chair and there was a good attendance of members.

A recommendation from the finance committee that the offer of Herman Leeland of \$250 cash for lots 31 and 32, block 5, section 1, Beach Place, be accepted was adopted by the city council last night.

Northland Navigation Co.'s motorship Bellingham, with one cargo of fresh halibut for transshipment to the United States over the Canadian National Railways arrived in port at 3 o'clock this morning from Ketchikan.

Rev. and Mrs. W. B. Jennings sailed this afternoon on the Catala for a trip to Vancouver. Mr. Jennings returned to the city on Sunday afternoon's train after a trip to Port Essington and other Skeena River points on ecclesiastical duties.

The city council last night granted a request from Adair Carss Chapter, Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, for permission to hold the annual tag day on April 18, for the fund for the upkeep of soldiers' graves at Fairview Cemetery.

Several more men, have been thrown out of work following the closing down of the Prosperity mine at Stewart, arrived in the city from the north on the Catala this morning, some disembarking here and others proceeding through to Vancouver.

The report of Fire Chief D. H. McDonald for the month of March presented to the city council last night announced that there had been eight alarms during the month. Damage amounted to \$57,50 all except \$7.50 of which was covered by insurance. Salaries of the department for the month amounted to \$1,077. Equipment was reported to be in good order.
