AIR PARTY'S FATE NEARS SOLUTION

TWO TO ONE VOTE FOR CONSERVATIVE IN FORT GEORGE

Practically Conceded Now That Robin Renahan and Companions Lost Lives in Sea on October 28

Further Investigation Is Made of Discovery of Two Wheels Which Ansel Eckmann Identified—Were Located Ten Miles Apart

As a result of information received here, it seemed logical yesterday to conclude that Pilot Robin Renahan of the Alaska-Washington Airways and party, who became missing on October 28 when going north to join the search for the late Capt. E. J. A. Burke and party, met death when their plane "cracked up" on the sea, probably in the vicinity of Annette Island, just south of Ketchikan. While Ansel Eckmann was loath to admit that this was the fate of Renahan and his two companions, Frank Hatcher, air mechanic, and Sam Clerf, Seattle mining man, until some further evidence had been obtained to make it seem more certain, he held out little hope for any other solution of the mystery.

AMY GIVES UP FLIGHT

Will Resume Her Aerial Trip to China Next Spring When Weather Is Better

WARSAW, Poland, Jan. 8.—Amy Johnson, English aviatrix, yesterday definitely postponed her flight to Peking, China, until weather is more favorable which she does not expect will be until spring. She will leave Warsaw by train tomorrow for Moscow where she expects to meet Soviet personages interested in her attempt and hopes to get full information necessary for her flight across the Ural Mountains and Siberia.

LIVES LOST IN FLIGHT

Several Italians Perished in Attempt to Cross Atlantic Yesterday

NATAL, Brazil, Jan. 8.—That five lives were lost among flyers of the Italian squadron, several of which were successful yesterday in crossing the Atlantic Ocean from Bolama, West Africa, is announced. Three others were injured. Two planes crashed after having developed engine trouble soon after they left Bolama. Two planes became missing in crossing the ocean and apparently were forced down. The others, however, pushed on under General Italo Balbo, Italian air minister and ten machines reached here safely.

Resisted Arrest; Gets Four Months

Matthais Mowatt of Hazelton Here En Route to Okalla—Charles Patsy Committed to Trial

Staff Sergeant Alex McNeill, provincial police, returned to the city on this afternoon's train from Hazelton, having in his custody Matthais Mowatt, an Indian, who was sentenced to four months' imprisonment for resisting arrest at the hands of Provincial Constable Harold Raybone. The episode with Mowatt is alleged to have taken place on Christmas Eve at the same time as Charles Patsy, another Indian, is charged with having assaulted Raybone by hitting him over the head with some sort of club. Patsy has been committed for trial and is now in jail at Smithers pending his appearance before Judge F. McB. Young in County Court there for election.

MOVE IS POPULAR

Scheme to Bring Peace to China and Improve World Business Taking Hold

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Details of a move in which United States and Canada are co-operating with a view to restoring peace in China and making a huge loan to that country with a view to putting it on a basis of industrial expansion, thus helping to relieve the present world depression and improve the silver situation in the world, will be presented in about ten days' time to the United States Senate.

The move, of which Hon. H. H. Stevens, Canadian minister of trade and commerce, was one of the original proponents, seems to be proving very popular and is catching the fancy of big financial and business interests in Canada as well as in the United States. It would be particularly beneficial to Pacific Coast trade of both countries.

PREMIER TO QUIT

Tolmie to Take Position With Federal Government, It Is Said In East

OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—In connection with the forthcoming resignation of H. S. Arkell, Dominion livestock commissioner of the Department of Agriculture, many reports are in circulation as to who will succeed him.

One is that Premier Tolmie of British Columbia, long identified with the livestock industry, would resign and accept an important position in the department in which his authority would extend over the livestock branch. However, there has been no confirmation of this rumor.

Federal Member Dies Suddenly

Heart Attack Takes Mayor Arthur Bettez of Three Rivers

THREE RIVERS, Que., Jan. 8.—Mayor Arthur Bettez, federal member for Three Rivers-St. Maurice, died suddenly at 11:45 a.m. Sunday at his home from a heart attack. He was apparently on the road to recovery from a recent illness, and was resting in an armchair when stricken.

SANCTITY OF MARRIAGE REAFFIRMED BY PONTIFF IN NOTABLE ENCYCLICAL

Pope Pius XI Condemns Birth Control and Divorce and Declares That Wife Should Be Subject to Husband Although Not His Slave

VATICAN CITY, Jan. 8.—Age old Catholic doctrines of marriage and divorce were reaffirmed and emphasized in an encyclical today by Pope Pius XI. He reaffirmed in the strongest terms the church's stand against birth control, divorce, sterilization and such modern travesties as trial, companionate or short termed marriages. Branding such practices as grave sin and specifically calling abortion murder, the Pontiff flayed in scathing terms those who would limit their children.

Citing the words of the apostle "Let women be subject to their husbands as to the Lord because the husband is head of the wife as Christ is head of the church," the Pontiff denies that this enjoins obedience of a wife to her husband's every request or that it implies that the wife should be out on a level with minors. "If man is the head," says the Pontiff, "woman is the heart and he occupies the chief place in ruling so she may and ought to claim for herself the chief place in love. This subjection of wife to husband in its degree and manner may vary according to different conditions of the person's place and time. In fact, if a husband neglect his duty, it falls upon the wife to take his place in directing the family."

The Pope stresses the unviolable stability of the marriage bond. "Man and wife," the Pontiff says, "are not fettered but adorned by this noble bond."

NO TRACE IS FOUND

Search of Twenty Men Fails in Finding Sign of Doukhobor Who Disappeared

Despite a thorough search by two police officers and twenty men by which practically the entire south part of Kalen Island was combed, no trace was found yesterday of William Antisees, 18-year old Doukhobor, who disappeared last Friday night at 6 o'clock from a wood-cutting camp on the Island Highway near the city limits. Antisees has not been seen since that time and no definite theory can be advanced for what may have happened to him.

Dr. Alward Wins Seat At Victoria With Big Lead In By-Election

Fifteen Polls Yet to Report Should Increase His Lead—Premier Tolmie Gloats Over Defeat of Labor—Farmer Candidate Who Made Solo Fight

PRINCE GEORGE, Jan. 8.—In the Fort George provincial by-election yesterday to fill the seat in the legislature made vacant through Hon. F. P. Burden leaving for London to become Agent General for British Columbia, thirty-five polls out of fifty, the latest returns available, gave Dr. R. W. Alward, Conservative candidate, 1325 votes and C. P. Deykin, his Farmer-Labor opponent, 665. As the various polls come in, Dr. Alward's lead is being gradually increased and his election is conceded. Remaining polls should, indeed, increase rather than decrease his lead. The outcome was as expected. Mr. Deykin entered the field and had little organized support, carrying on his campaign practically single-handed.

VICTORIA, Jan. 8.—Commenting last night upon the result of the Fort George by-election, Premier S. F. Tolmie said in part: "Dr. Alward's immense lead I regard as approval of our policy for the development of Central British Columbia and an outlet for the Peace River and of our efforts to extend the Pacific Great Eastern Railway into the Peace River with the co-operation of the major railways of Canada. "I also regard it as an indication of approval of what we have done in advertising the potentialities and scenic charms of the district. "Further, it is an endorsement of our selection of Mr. Burden to act as Agent General for British Columbia in London."

ONTARIO DEFICIT

For First Time Since 1926, Provincial Treasurer Is Behind Rather Than Ahead

TORONTO, Jan. 8.—For the first time since 1926, the annual pre-session report of the provincial treasurer of Ontario shows a deficit. It amounts to \$628,000 despite an increase of \$3,303,000 in the province's revenue. The deficit is attributed by Hon. E. A. Dunlop, provincial treasurer, to generally prevailing economic conditions.

QUEBEC FLOODS

Waters Had Receded After Forcing People From Homes—Merchants Suffer Losses

QUEBEC, Jan. 8.—The waters of the St. Lawrence and St. Charles Rivers were at their normal levels yesterday following a sudden flood Tuesday night which inundated parts of the lower town of this city. Levis and Stadacona. Many families, which had been forced to leave their homes, had returned to their houses. Damage is estimated at thousands of dollars and is chiefly to merchants' stocks. Intense cold had followed one of the worst snow and wind storms in years.

WORKLESS NUMEROUS

United States Investigator Estimates 5,000,000 Without Jobs In His Country

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Chairman Woods of the Hoover committee on employment estimated yesterday before the Senate appropriations committee that there are between 4,000,000 and 5,000,000 unemployed in the United States. Unemployment had been increasing, Mr. Woods said, and he did not believe the situation would improve until spring. He believed the lowest period concerning employment was likely to be felt this month and next.
