CANCELLING OF DEBTS

Interesting Innovation By Means of
\$50 Check Started From
Georgia City

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 9:—As a novel means of stimulating a return to normal business conditions a check of \$150 was started Dec. 22 on a journey in which it may cancel \$15,000 of debt within 60 days.

The movement was launched here by the Chamber of Commerce, the Savannah Sugar Refining Company donating three \$50 checks to the chamber, to be used in a specified way to pay a series of debts and to point the way to what prompt payment of current obligations can do toward putting money into circulation.

The three \$50 checks were of magnified size made especially for the purpose, and given to B. S. Barker, secretary of the chamber, who in turn gave one to the local Salvation Army, one to the local Family Welfare Society, and the third to a widow who is "out of employment and owes debts."

The condition upon which they are given is that the Salvation Army use its check in a payment on a bill for coal; that the Welfare Society make with its check a prompt payment on a grocery bill and that the widow use hers for a payment on a furniture bill.

Each of these payments is to be made only on condition that the firm to which it is made agrees in turn to pay promptly some indebtedness, imposing the same conditions upon its creditor who is to use the check at once in the same way. For 60 days these three checks are to be so used, being passed on promptly by each recipient to a creditor. At the end of the 60 days the persons in whose possession they fall will be permitted to cash them for their own use. The first payments by the Salvation Army, the Welfare Society and the needy widow were made December 22 and it is anticipated that these checks will change hands from three to six times daily in the ensuing 60 days.

Hope For Prairies In Mixed Farming

Minister of Agriculture For Alberta
Urges Zoning of Farm Land
In Province

EDMONTON, Jan. 8:—Much has been said in recent years about the advisability of the farmers in the Canadian West going in for mixed farming, and a considerable number have done so to a certain extent, but it has not become general on the prairies. The importance of mixed farming was stressed by the minister of agriculture for Alberta, Hon. George Hoadley, in a speech at Vegreville, recently.

Mr. Hoadley expressed the belief that the salvation of agriculture in the west depended upon mixed farming. He referred to the work the department of agriculture is doing in zoning the province as to its agricultural possibilities. That is, certain districts are being set aside as containing land suitable for wheat growing and in which the cultivation of wheat is recommended by the department, while other districts are being set aside as particularly suited to mixed farming and so recommended.

The minister of agriculture claimed that one reason for the present depression in the west is that high pressure salesmanship has placed on the farms a good deal of machinery that the farmers have not required, and now the farmers are being pressed for payment of the debts which they contracted when they bought the machinery.
