

CANCELLING OF DEBTS

Interesting Innovation By Means of \$50 Check Started From Georgia City

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 9:-As a novel means of stimulating a return to normal business conditions a check of \$150 was started Dec. 22 on a journey in which it may cancel \$15,-000 of debt within 60 days.

The movement was launched here by the Chamber of Commerce, the Savannah Sugar Refining Company donating three \$50 checks to the chamber, to be used in a specified way to pay a series of debts and to point the way to what prompt paynent of current obligations can do toward putting money into circula-

The three \$50 checks were of nagnified size made especially for the purpose, and given to B. S. Barker, secretary of the chamber, who in turn gave one to the local Salvation Army, one to the local Famly Welfare Society, and the third to a widow who is "out of employment and owes debts."


