HEART BALM SUITS LESS

Notable Falling Off in London in Breach of Promise Cases

LONDON, Aug. 12.—Less and less do breach of promise cases appear on the law lists. They promise soon to be a novelty. When only five such cases were set down for one London session, lawyers remarked at the falling off of this lucrative business, and that now it had reached the lowest level since the war. The decline of this class of action has been especially marked in the last two or three years. This, despite the fact that announcements of broken engagements have become more frequent. Last year alone over 90 announcements of cancelled marriages in the upper ranks of English society were published in the press.

Now for the reasons for the falling off, as given by lawyers: (1) Shorter engagements. (2) Entry of women into business. (3) The fall in scale of breach damages awarded.

"Back in the 'nineties," says one authority, "damages exceeding \$5,000 were frequently awarded for breach of promise. But not so today. Recently many successful plaintiffs have received less than \$250. One reason why the damages in the past were heavy, was that engagements were much longer and plaintiffs could show that they had waited, five, seven and even 10 years. The modern girl is in a different position. Engagements are fulfilled or broken off within a few months."

A woman has her say, too: "Under the terms of the law a man is as much at liberty to sue for breach of promise as is a woman. Yet you rarely read of men taking such action. That implies that men have a better sense of their dignity than women. The whole procedure is most undignified, and I cannot understand any woman taking part in it. I imagine the law was passed in the days when a broken engagement meant degradation to a woman. Women nowadays are capable of looking after themselves."
