# IS SUED

Famous Baseball Manager Asks For Umpire in Connection With His Income Taxes

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 22:-Rogers Hornsby, famous professional baseball manager, has petitioned for an umpire in connection with a dispute between himself and the government in connection with delinquent income taxes.

Hornsby was first assessed to the extent of \$2,763 for income taxes due since 1927 but now the government says he owes \$8,702. Hornsby protests at the latest assessment and declares he is not entitled to pay it.
