he first joined the Manitoba Government he took charge of the Department of the Provincial Secretary.

Mr. Prefontaine is also the chairman of the Co-operative Marketing Board of Manitoba, and is thus brought into close contact with producers in his Province.

In 1880 he took up his residence in Manitoba and for the last twentythree years has been president of the St. Pierre Trading Company.
