NEWSPRINT PRODUCTION

Past Year Was Light One, 1931 May be bigger

Figures furnished by the Powell River Company and Pacific Mills Limited, indicate that newsprint production in British Columbia last year was valued at nearly \$12,000,000.

Newsprint to the amount of 277,000 tons was manufactured by these two companies during the past year, representing a considerable increase in tonnage as compared with 1929. Pacific Mills production was down to some extent owing to the freeze-up and power shortage early in the spring.

It is probable that newsprint output during the present year will be the highest on record as a result of the completion of the new Lois River development of the Powell River Company which will enable that company to average about 620 tons daily as compared with 500 tons the previous year. The No. 7 machine of Powell River Co. has been in operation since the beginning of the year.

PRESIDENT TESTIFIES

William Colmer Admits He Knew Seattle Company Was Shaky

SEATTLE, April 15:—Testifying before the King County Grand Jury yesterday in connection with the affairs of the Puget Sound Savings & Loan Co., William D. Colmer, who was president of the concern last fall when it suspended business, is said to have admitted that he knew the affairs of the company were unsteady when he merged it with the Mutual Savings & Loan Co., 19 months ago. Colmer blamed the manipulations of Adolph Lindén, former president, for the state of company affairs.


