"In view that Canadian crops are in direct competition with such countries as the Argentine, it becomes essential that Canada takes full advantage of the most direct and economical routes to seaboards.

"Peace development would be a direct advantage to the railroads as well as the producer. It would afford large the children of Annunciation freight tonnage.

"It would enable the C. N. R. to take full advantage of its low gradients, which, without such increased tonnage, is not sufficiently able to capitalize.

"Through the development of the Peace great advantages would accrue in transcontinental haulage through the increased power of consumption of a large increase in population.

"The City of Vancouver submits that the Commission should give serious consideration to this vital national! question of affording access to the Peace by the immediate development of railway facilities, and ask that the commission recommend accordingly."
