#### Halibut Catch The Pacific Fisherman, in

rough, preliminary estimate, places the halibut production on the Pacific Coast for the 1931 season at approximately 42,000,000 pounds representing a decline of some 8,-000,000 pounds from the official toal of 50,466,632 pounds for the 1930 season. "The loss can be accounted for," says the Pacific Fisherman, "largely by the reduction in the length of the fishing season which this year was approximately six weeks shorter than in 1930. At the beginning of the fishing season last spring operations were practically suspended for five weeks owing to feeling optimistic." disagreement between the vessel owners and fishermen. Furthrmore, the new international treaty regulating the halibut fishery closed the season November 1 instead of November 15. Thus the season was substantially shortened at both ends with material restriction of production natural. This tendency was further aided by the withdrawal of a considerable number of boats to other fisheries as a result of low prices prevailing for halibut.
