PHYSICIAN IS HEARD

Dr. J. H. Carson Addresses Parent-Teachers on Medical Inspection of School Pupils

The address by Dr. J. H. Carson on "Medical Inspection of School Pupils from the Point of View of the Parent and Teacher," drew a large attendance to Borden Street School last evening to the regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Parent Teachers' Association.

Dr. Carson spoke on the history of school medical inspections, pointing out the rapid growth of this movement as a result of the recognition of its importance by parents generally and the pressure of this opinion on school boards. The expense was an initial obstacle but school boards were at the mercy of the ratepayers in this respect and, in go-ahead communities where the supreme value of health was recognized, the school boards were assured of the backing of the parents.

In Prince Rupert this year the work was being done by all five doctors. Dr. Carson took up the health card and pointed out the various features of the inspection. Slips were sent to the parents telling them in what respects the children should consult the family doctor. The weights were checked, the eyes tested, ears tested, tonsils examined and a superficial examination made of the heart and lungs. This was of necessity somewhat perfunctory as it was not possible to give a complete examination under existing arrangements. No examination of the abdomen, bowels or kidneys was provided for. The value of the examination was indeed very great in spite of these limitations but the full value could not be realized unless the results were followed up.

There was vital need of a school nurse. In the large cities each school had a nurse and the recommendations of the doctor were followed up by the nurse who was able to see the children frequently and consult with the parents with a view to finding out possible ways of making and keeping the children up to normal. The expense was the usual argument against the engagement of a whole-time nurse. Experience had proved that, where communities had once engaged a nurse, there never was any later criticism of the cost. It was a good investment. In this regard a strong campaign by such an organization as the Parent-Teachers' Association could be of much value in impressing upon citizens in general the need for such an outlay. Dr. Carson also hinted that a new pair of scales would be needed. The present pair had been lent to the doctors and were not entirely reliable.

The assistance of teachers was also asked for in regard to filling up the spaces on the medical health cards showing their opinions on the

state of the pupils' conduct, cleanliness, efficiency and effort.

Vote of Thanks

On motion of W. W. C. O'Neill, seconded by D. H. Hartness, a very hearty vote of thanks was accorded the speaker.

Mr. O'Neill pointed out the high level to which the importance and value of these school medical inspections had been raised as a result of Dr. Carson's own efforts when he first took over the appointment and his subsequent success in convincing people generally.

Mr. Hartness was glad to hear of the emphasis laid on the follow-up of the inspections. This was the real factor in making the movement a success.

J. S. Wilson supported the motion, claiming that parents themselves were to blame in persisting in supporting the out-of-date attitude that schools were only for the purpose of imparting knowledge. That was part of their function in the community but after all health was of the greatest importance.

In the absence of the president through illness, Mrs. S. V. Cox presided. Pianoforte solos were rendered by Miss Jean McLean and Miss S. A. Mills accompanied by the singing of "O Canada," and the "National Anthem." A committee under Mrs. E. B. Baker was responsible for refreshments that were served at the conclusion of the business meeting.

Arrangements were also made in the appointment of conveners for the Easter candy sales at the various schools. Mrs. Cox, Mrs. W. Brown and Mrs. Stamp-Vincent were appointed, the convener for Seal Cove to be appointed later.

WATT CASE DISCUSSED

Vancouver Star Commends Both Government and Opposition For Reinstatement of Agent

The Opposition in the provincial legislature is to be congratulated on the success that has attended its strenuous efforts to obtain justice for Norman Watt, who, it will be recalled, was summarily discharged from his government position at Prince Rupert by the Hon. W. C. Shelly very soon after that gentleman became minister of finance.

The government, too, is to be commended for the celerity with which it has accepted and acted on the finding of Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald that the allegations against Mr. Watt, as a consequence of which he had lost his position, were totally unfounded.

Thus ends, happily, one of the most unpleasant incidents in the history of the present administration. It was a flagrant example of partisan judgment. Unfortunately there is only too much reason to suppose that others besides Mr. Watt have been evicted from their offices on grounds that were investigated, would prove just as untenable, though less serious in their nature, as those on which he was sent about his business.—Vancouver Star.
