SEATTLE, March 25.—The Seattle Eskimos will go on the home ice tonight in the second game of the Pacific Hockey League play-offs confident of their ability to vanquish the Vancouver Lions, who took the first game at Vancouver Monday night.

The Eskimos, who returned home from Vancouver yesterday, were not the least downhearted as a result of their loss there. "We played a strong enough game Monday night to win under any ordinary circumstances," declared Captain Red Stewart. Phenomenal goal tending by Percy Jackson was the only reason for the Eskimos being turned back, Stewart said.

All the Seattle players are in the best of physical condition for tonight's match, even Ernie Anderson, who has recovered from an injured leg. If the Eskimos win tonight, they are confident they will be able to repeat Friday night in the third game which will also be played here.

William O. (Bill) Cook, New York Rangers right winger chosen by the majority of National Hockey League sports editors for all-star honors, talks farming and economics as well as he recounts hockey lore. "I can't see any bright future yet for the wheat farmer," says Bill, who between seasons operates a 480-acre wheat farm at Lac Vert, Sask. "Why, up on my farm, my wheat brings me 30 cents a bushel; it may be worth 56 cents in Winnipeg, but I get the 30 cents in Lac Vert. Co-operative marketing is all right, provided you have the market even after you form your organization. The basic foundation may be entirely sound, but there must still be an outlet and market for the farmer's wheat. Reduction of wheat acreage, as urged by the United States Farm Board, will produce better results in the States, I think, than would be the case in Canada. The enormous population of the United States could more readily absorb the output of mixed farming, but in Canada where there are extensive farm lands and a comparatively small population, the farmer would not benefit. Up my way many tried raising pigs; prices for pigs soon dropped to about a third of what they had been. I do not think cattle raising on a larger scale would be profitable for Canadian farmers."

In New York, the Rangers piled up a 5 to 1 lead over the Montreal Maroons in the third place play-off. It is hardly possible that the Maroons will be able to overcome this four goal lead in the second game to be played at Montreal tomorrow night.
