With terrific fighting, the tenth and last round was undoubtedly the best of a great bout. Both men were after a knockout and after it strong. Both, however, were much in action as the final gong was sounded.

WASHINGTON WINS GAME

Scores Surprise by Defeating California 41 to 25 in Hoop Game

SEATTLE, March 7.—Making a surprisingly superior showing, the University of Washington coached by Hec Edmundson, last night won the first game of the Pacific Coast conference championship basketball series by a score of 41 to 25 from the University of California.

The second game of the series will take place this evening and in view of their fine victory last night, they now have great hopes of making it two straight. However if California wins and a third game is necessary, it will take place Monday night.

Last night's score well represented the difference in the teams. California did not show up anything like was expected. Washington exhibited a flashy five-man attack throughout the game. Hank Swanson was high scorer for the winning team with thirteen points. Seven thousand fans or more saw the match.

The Pacific coast conference basketball series here will be decided by the best two out of three games.

The University of California have been given a slight edge to win the title which they have held for the past two years. Although several of the University of Washington players have recovered from illness with influenza, the Californians were still conceded to have the physical advantage. At that the Washingtonians look like they are going to turn out the best players.
