WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Halibutters Expect to Get Busy Soon—Swan Gets
New Engine—Dry Dock Finishing
Cruisers

Pending the holding of a conference this week-end with officials of the United Pacific Fisheries, there were no new developments of much importance during the week in the halibut fishing situation at Prince Rupert. While nothing definite had been settled up to last night, the week has seen most of the boats outfitting for their first trips of the season to the banks, the general expectation being that they will be off by early next week. Before making any more definite decisions on the matter in hand, boat owners and fishermen decided to wait for more assurances from the United Pacific Fisheries in the matter of prices. Since the original announcement was made, it is understood that the price of 13c and 9c might not apply to both American and Canadian fish but that, owing to the American duty, the Canadian price might be somewhat lower. What would be done about it if this were actually the case seemed to be uncertain. Meantime, the fishermen have resolutely remained at home, contending that they would lose less money by remaining in port than by going out to bring in fish for sale at old prices and under the new grading system. There is a feeling of confidence on the part of boat owners and fishermen alike that, by holding back now, they will be instrumental in bringing about a lasting improvement in the matter of prices to be paid for their product. Developments of this week were being anticipated with interest.

After a rough trip up the coast, the well known United Church mission boat Thomas Crosby, with Rev. Captain Robert C. Scott in charge, arrived in port Tuesday night from Ocean Falls via waypoints. On board were Rev. Arthur Barner of Toronto superintendent of Indian Missions of the church in Canada, and Rev. W. H. Gibson, the cleric being here to attend the annual Presbytery meeting in this city this week. After conclusion of the Presbytery, Capt. Scott was to return to headquarters at Ocean Falls with the Thomas Crosby. Up till a few months ago, the Thomas Crosby was stationed on the Queen Charlotte Islands.

Pacific Salvage Co.'s power tug Billmor, with Capt. Charlie Larkin and Capt. Norman Brodhurst in charge, left Wednesday night of this week for Brown's Mill on the Eestall River, having in tow a boom of logs from the Billmor Spruce Mills. The Billmor returned to port Thursday night after making a safe delivery.

On Trip to Skeena

Having on board T. Herman of the Dominion Water Power Branch, Ottawa, who was to check up the water measure gauges at Khtada, Brown's River and Falls River, the Pacific Salvage Co.'s power tug Billmor, with Capt. W. E. Willis in charge, left port yesterday morning for the Skeena River. The P. M. L. 2 is expected back tonight if all goes well.

Installation of a 60 h.p. Kermath engine in the Power Corporation of Canada's service cruiser Swan was completed this week. The engine, which replaces a Ford Marine, was formerly used in a company run-boat. It has greatly increased the speed of the Swan. Under the name of J. O. Bouillaine, the Swan has now become a member of the Prince Rupert Rowing & Yacht Club fleet. Capt. Lorne Peck is skipper of the Swan which was built here a few years ago by George Kelsey of Seal Cove, having later been stationed at Stewart.

H. N. Brocklesby, acting director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, left at the end of last week for a trip to Vancouver to attend a meeting of the Pacific Coast sub-executive of the Biological Board of Canada. Mr. Brocklesby expected to be away for about two weeks should be back in about another week's time.

A good run of herring still con-

tinues at Pearl Harbor. Scowloads continue to be delivered regularly to the Rupert Marine Products plant up Tucks Inlet for reduction purposes.

The local halibut boat Teeny Milly, Capt. George Cook, left on Wednesday night of this week for Ketchikan, having as a passenger Dr. R. V. Ellis returning to Ketchikan after a trip to Washington, D. C. The Teeny Milly returned to port Thursday night.

Returns to Port

After a year's exile at Jap Inlet, the hull of Capt. Jud Thurber's old halibut boat Muirneag was towed into port this week by Capt. Billy Hanson with the Thelma H. It is understood that Capt. Thurber plans to have the Muirneag reconditioned and engine installed so the vessel may be put to use again.

Fisheries Patrol steamer Malaspina was at the wharf of Albert & McCaffrey on Thursday afternoon for a load of coal fuel.

Dr. L. W. Kergin's fine new power cruiser has just about been completed at the local dry dock and it will not be long now before it will be moving down to take up a berth at the floats of the Prince Rupert Rowing & Yacht Club.

Good progress is also being made at the dry dock on the construction of a new mission boat to replace the Northern Cross in the coast mission work of the Anglican Church.

Dr. R. G. Large came into town on Thursday afternoon from Port Simpson with the Sunbeam III. In tow the doctor had a speedboat hull in which the 35 h.p. Universal engine, formerly in the Sunbeam, is to be installed here.

Freight Rates On Automobiles Being Taken Up

At the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce last night a letter was read from Hon. R. W. Bruhn, minister of public works, in which he stated that the matter of cheaper freight rates on automobiles from Prince Rupert to Terrace and Prince Rupert to Hazelton, was being taken up with the railway company and he asked the Board for suggestions as to what should be done. The matter was referred to the freight rates committee.

TRI-CITY RUN OFF

Damage to Prince Henry Causes
Cancelling Service

VANCOUVER, March 7.—Owing to an accident several days ago when ss. Prince Henry struck a floating log and damaged her propeller, the tri-city service of the Canadian National steamships between the ports of Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle has been temporarily discontinued. It is expected that this service will be resumed on or about March 21.

Because the termination of the guarantee period for this ship is so close, the representative of the builders, who is in Vancouver, has insisted that a minute inspection also be made of the main and intermediate shafts. This will take about two weeks time, but the builders consider the further inspection is essential as a protective measure.
