Mrs. W. V. Tattersal, who has been visiting with her son and daughter at Stewart, returned to the city from the north on the Catala yesterday afternoon.

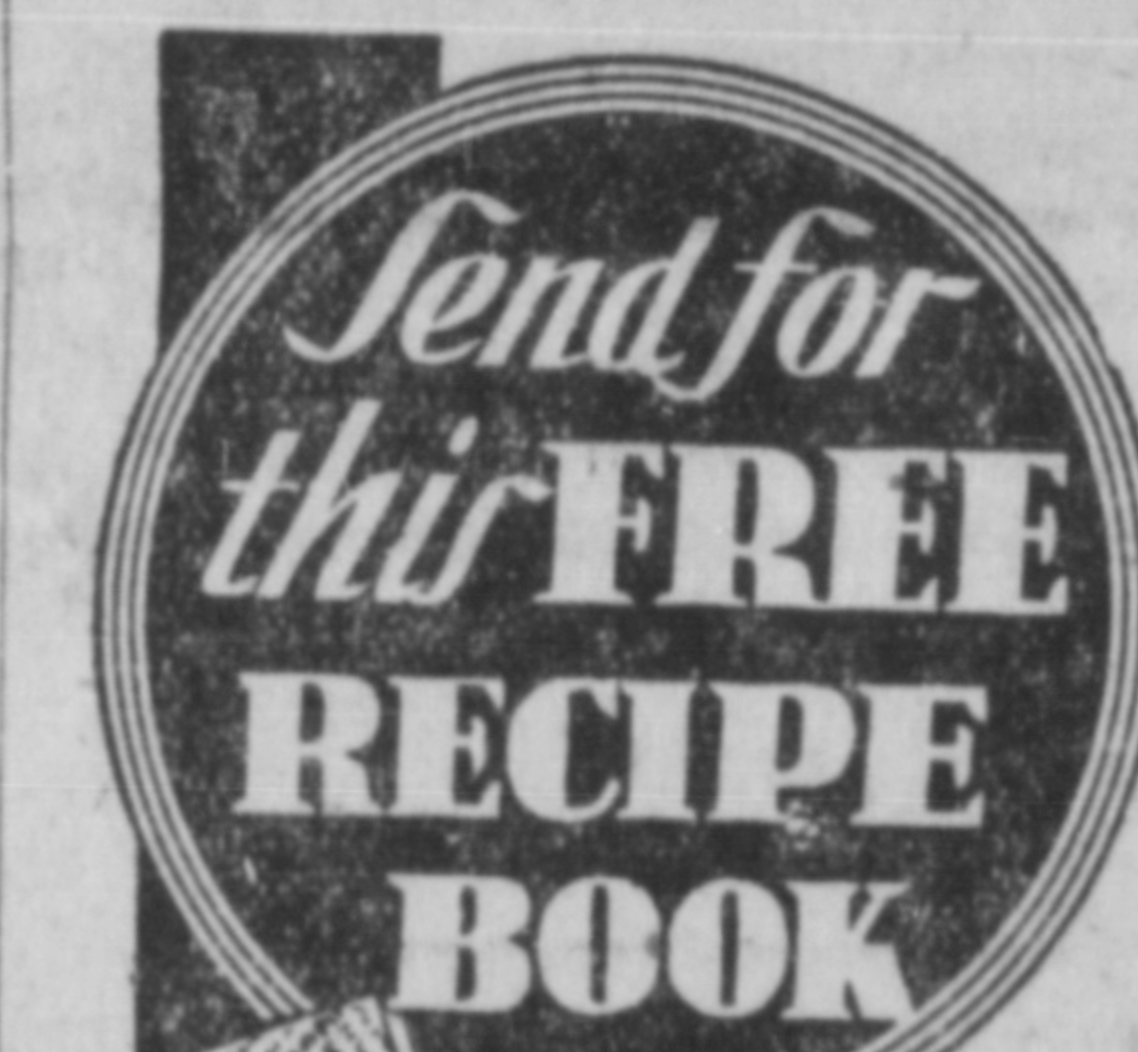
