CHURCH MEETING

1930 Was Successful Year For First
United Congregation—Confi-
dence Voted in Minister

The annual congregational meet-
ing of First United Church was
held last evening with a goodly
number of members of the church
in attendance. Reports of the var-
ious organizations of the church,
detailing their work for the past
year, were read by the secretaries.
Each and all of them evinced pro-
gress attained, every society show-

that of the Women's Missionary So-
ciety by Mrs. W. T. Kergin and the
Sunday School by W. J. E. Barrie.

church.

gave a general report upon the
work of the church and session dur-
ing the year. This report was very
encouraging. After Mr. Wilson had
concluded, a very warm vote of
confidence and appreciation for
his services was unanimously car-
ried.

Wilson were elected to the session,
succeeding W. J. Kirkpatrick, and
Mrs. W. Harper, succeeding Mrs.
George Beveridge, who has left the
city.

A resolution conveying a warm
vote of thanks to T. J. Shenton for
his work as a member of the session
was carried.

The meeting closed after full jus-
tice had been done to delicious re-
freshments furnished by the ladies
of the church.

in the city recently from Edmon-
ton, has taken over the dental
practice of Dr. E. S. Tait, who left
this afternoon for Vancouver
where he will practise in future.

Dr. Johnson graduated in den-
tistry from the University at Oslo,

way. He then came to this contin-
ent and studied at New York and
Chicago, finishing at Minneapolis
with the degree of doctor of den-
tal surgery. He practised in Ed-
monton for six months and then
came to Vancouver where he took
his British Columbia examinations
successfully.
