## 'Christ Jesus' Was Christian Science Subject

The subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Christian Science churches and societies on Sunday was "Christ Jesus."

## BLAZE IN HOSPITAL

Institution at Work Point Barracks  
Esquimalt, is Destroyed by  
Flames

VICTORIA, March 2.—Fire breaking out in the basement of the military hospital at Work Point barracks, Esquimalt, Saturday gutted the interior of the building but thirteen patients were safely removed before the blaze made much headway.

A number of soldiers were overcome by smoke while fighting the outbreak but recovered after receiving first aid.

A large number of valuable records were destroyed. No estimate of the loss was available at noon.
