

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The RECORD SPEAKS for ITSELF

In opening the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto on Friday, August 28, Earl Jellicoe said: "Over a period of 52 years, the population of Canada has increased by 6,000,000; the revenue of the Government from \$22,000,000 to \$460,000,000 and the value of her trade from \$169,000,000 to \$2,400,000,000. In the same time, her manufactures have increased ten-fold and her crop acreage three-fold. This remarkable record encourages a feeling of optimism for the future." Earl Jellicoe also made the following reference:

"Canada's record growth constitutes an achievement of world importance and stands as a challenge to future progress. This phenomenal growth is the direct result of that splendid courage and determination which the people of Canada showed so strikingly from 1914-1918".

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
