

FISHERMEN'S STRIKE

Member of Audit Bureau of Circulations

Although Prince Rupert is a fishing community, many people here do not understand the reason for the strike which is continuing at Seattle.

The owners of the boats say that they have expended a lot of money putting in diesel engines and other equipment which cuts down the cost of operating the vessels but increases the overhead. Because of that they say they should have a larger share of the proceeds than formerly.

The fishermen, while agreeing that the cost of operating has been cut down, declare that the fish are becoming less plentiful and that the life is a hard one and worth all they get while employed in the calling. They say that their earnings have been reduced owing to greater difficulty in securing catches and the high cost of gear.

The Seattle boats are generally larger than those operating out of Prince Rupert.


