STEAMER PRINCE DAVID ASHORE IN PUGET SOUND TODAY

Canadian National Ship Runs Aground in Dense Fog Near Pt. Townsend

Passengers Removed to Princess Kathleen and Taken to Victoria-Big Ship In No Danger and Is Expected to Refloat Soon

VANCOUVER, July 31: - The Canadian National steamer Prince David, en route from Victoria to Seattle, went ashore at 10:45 this morning at Point Wilson, near Port Townsend, in the fog at low water. The passengers were removed to the Canadian Pacific steamer Princess Kathleen, which was nearby, and taken to Victoria. The steamer is not believed to be seriously damaged and is expected to be refloated very soon.



Great Swedish Churchman Dies

Archibishop Nathan Soderbloom Passes Away at Upsalah From Heart Failure

Word has reached the city of the recent death from heart failure in Upalah, Sweden, of Archibishop Nathan Soderbloom, one of the

best known of Scandinavian clerics. Born in Helsingfors, Finland, in 1866, the late Archibishop Soderbloom became pastor of the Swedish Lutheran Church in Paris in 1894. In 1923 he was instrumental in calling a conference of church people of all countries with a view to advancing the interests of world peace. In 1930, the Noble Peace Prize was awarded to Archbishop Soderbloom.
