
STEAMER PRINCE DAVID ASHORE IN PUGET SOUND TODAY

Canadian National Ship Runs Aground in Dense Fog Near Pt. Townsend

Passengers Removed to Princess Kathleen and Taken to
Victoria—Big Ship in No Danger and Is Ex-
pected to Refloat Soon

VANCOUVER, July 31:—The Canadian National steamer Prince David, en route from Victoria to Seattle, went ashore at 10:45 this morning at Point Wilson, near Port Townsend, in the fog at low water. The passengers were removed to the Canadian Pacific steamer Princess Kathleen, which was nearby, and taken to Victoria. The steamer is not believed to be seriously damaged and is expected to be refloated very soon.

LINDBERGH'S AT OTTAWA

Famous Flyer and His Wife Make
Safe Landing at Canadian
Capital

OTTAWA, July 31:—Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh, completing the initial hop of their projected flight to Japan, landed in the Ottawa River off Rock Cliff Airport at 4:36 yesterday afternoon (Ottawa time) from North Haven, Maine.

Col. Lindbergh, after circling over the city for several minutes, brought his big Lockheed-Sirius monoplane down to a perfect landing on the river while Mrs. Lindbergh wireless the news of their safe arrival to the office of the Pan-American Airways in New York.

The couple will probably take off tomorrow on the second hop of their long flight.

VANCOUVER, July 31:—An earthquake shock, which the Victoria observatory reported as probably originating between Nanaimo and Vancouver, shook houses in the western portion of Vancouver and in Nanaimo yesterday morning. No damage was done.

Former Premier Protests At Innuendo and Insinuation in the Report of Special Committee

Power Project Was Approved on Its Merits and Not Be-
cause of Political Pressure—Denies Knowledge
of Campaign Fund Source

OTTAWA, July 31:—Protesting that innuendo and insinuation against the former Liberal government had been sandwiched into the report of the Beauharnois committee, Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, former premier, last night in the House of Commons defended the record of his administration. The Beauharnois project, he declared, had been approved on its merits.

TAKE OVER SHIP LINE

C. P. R. to Absorb Canadian Aus-
tralian Royal Mail, Van-
couver Hears

VANCOUVER, July 31:—It is widely rumored in shipping circles that the Canadian Pacific Railway is negotiating for a controlling interest in the Canadian Australian Royal Mail Co. Ltd.

According to the rumor, the Canadian Pacific would take over the liners Aorangi and Niagara, operating between Sydney and Vancouver, and augment the service with some of the Duchess vessels from the Atlantic Ocean.

Prince of Wales Is Injured As He Drives Car Into Fence Following Collision Thursday

LONDON, July 31:—The Prince of Wales figured in another accident yesterday. The heir to the throne escaped with slight injuries from a mix-up in which he might easily have been seriously hurt if not killed. His Royal Highness, driving his zeppelin-shaped automobile, collided with another car. To avoid hitting a number of pedestrians, the Prince drove the vehicle into a fence. The car sustained considerable damage.

CROSSING ATLANTIC

Ten Men Have Succeeded in Span-
ning Ocean By Air This Year

NEW YORK, July 31:—With the safe arrival yesterday at Istanbul, Turkey, of Russell Boardman and John Polando, American flyers, after a non-stop flight from New York, ten men had so far this summer flown across the Atlantic Ocean without injury or accident. All the flights this year have been in the eastward direction.

Flying last night between Berlin and Moscow, Hugh Herndon Jr. and Clyde Pangborn were 14 hours behind Wiley Post and Harold Gatty, whose nine-day record for the flight around the world they are endeavoring to break.

MOSCOW, July 31:—Clyde Pangborn and Hugh Herndon, Jr., landed here from Berlin at 11:52 this morning and left at 5:20 p.m. for Irkutsk in Central Russia.

NEW PLEA IS ASKED

Al Capone Nervous After Trial
Judge Threatens to Impose
Long Prison Term

CHICAGO, July 31:—Assured by Circuit Judge Wilkerson yesterday afternoon that Al Capone had no right to expect, because he had pleaded guilty to charges of evasion of the federal prohibition and income tax laws, that he would receive a light sentence, counsel for the 32-year old gang leader of this city hastened to apply for permission to change the plea from that of guilty to not guilty. The judge reserved until today his decision on the application.

Should Capone be allowed to alter his plea to that of not guilty, the ensuing trial might last for a year. If the application is not granted, there is every reason in view of the judge's declaration yesterday, that a heavy sentence will be imposed.

Great Swedish Churchman Dies

Archbishop Nathan Soderbloom
Passes Away at Upsala From
Heart Failure

Word has reached the city of the recent death from heart failure in Upsala, Sweden, of Archbishop Nathan Soderbloom, one of the best known of Scandinavian clergies. Born in Helsingfors, Finland, in 1866, the late Archbishop Soderbloom became pastor of the Swedish Lutheran Church in Paris in 1894. In 1923 he was instrumental in calling a conference of church people of all countries with a view to advancing the interests of world peace. In 1930, the Noble Peace Prize was awarded to Archbishop Soderbloom.

The late Archbishop Soderbloom spoke seventeen languages fluently.

Pioneer Builder Of Province Passes

Andrew J. Crowe Passes Away in
Vancouver at Age of 79

VANCOUVER, July 31:—Andrew J. Crowe, aged 79, pioneer British Columbia builder and contractor, died yesterday.
