HAZELTON BOYS LOSE AGAIN, 16-0

LOCALS WIN LACROSSE

Defeated Aiyansh 5 to 2 Yesterday In Rough Game

The second Aiyansh-Prince Rupert lacrosse game was won by Prince Rupert by a score of 5 to 2 yesterday, Rupert thus standing with a lead of three goals in two games.

Veterans and young subs sprung a surprise on the Indians, the former showing how the game ought to be played and the latter displaying an exhibition of speed. The whole Rupert team showed good self-control when the Indians laid on the wood which was overlooked by the referees.

From the face-off, Prince Rupert rushed, Clanton showing his heels to opposition to give the ball to Unger who drove in the first score. Mercer, the Indian goalie, proved to be the right man for the position, but had nothing on the old war horse, Muck Menzie, Prince Rupert goalie.

Aiyansh tied the score in three minutes by some clever stick-handling by Steve Eli feeding Cuthbert Moore, his inside home man.

Rupert pressed hard feeding Dick Woods who scored. Bert Unger carried and passed to Woods who made Prince Rupert's third goal. At this stage of the game the veterans Doug Frizzell, Elmer Smith, Scoop Bury, Doug Stalker and Brick Skinner, held the Indian sharpshooters so far out as to render scoring impossible.

In the second period Bill Gosnell went through on his own to make it four for Rupert.

In the final period, Joe Gillis, a mere youngster, stick handled his way through to make Rupert's final score. A disputed goal by Dennis Morvan was eventually allowed which finished the scoring for the game.

The Indians forced the play desperately, striving to pull the game out of the fire but the Rupert defence was not to be beaten. Big Train Stalker occasionally carried the ball through a maze of sticks to finally test the Indian goalie.
