## WORKLESS ARE MANY

Total of Unemployed in Canada 530,000 With 38,000 in British Columbia

OTTAWA, Sept. 4.—Canada's unemployed now exceed 530,000, according to Senator Gideon Robertson, minister of labor.

In British Columbia, the minister's statement continued, there are 38,880 unemployed of which number nearly 6,000 are transients and nearly 7,000 aliens.

## GENERAL McRAE NAMED SENATOR

OTTAWA, Sept. 4.—Major General A. D. McRae of Vancouver, former M.P. for North Vancouver and Conservative organizer for Canada in connection with the last general election, has been appointed to the Senate, it was announced today. He succeeds the late Senator S. J. Crowe of Vancouver, who died recently. General McRae entered politics several years ago when he formed the provincial party in British Columbia to oppose the Conservative and Liberal parties.
