TO TRADE WITH FIJI

AUCKLAND, N.Z., Jan. 17.—The decision of the legislative council of Fiji to seek a reciprocal agreement with Canada to the exclusion of Australia and New Zealand is causing some concern in New Zealand. Efforts are now being made by the New Zealand government to come to an understanding with its tropical neighbor.

Interest in Fiji in the trade position between Canada and Fiji was awakened in June last when the Canadian Trade Commissioner in New Zealand, M. Croft, whose territory also includes Fiji, paid a visit to Suva and addressed business men and planters there on the advantages to be gained by Fiji as a result of increased trade with Canada.

Last year's trade returns showed that Fiji purchased from Australia goods valued at £543,963, while that country bought from Fiji only £52,691. The position with New Zealand was better, Fiji purchases totaling £140,418 while New Zealand took goods to the value of £202,797. But while Canada bought goods to the value of £546,489, Fiji purchases totalled only £84,822. Australia, whom Fiji treated best, treated her worst.

"How long," asked members in the Fiji legislature, "was Canada going to be content to buy from us and receive comparatively nothing in return?" In lumber, it was said, preference to Canada could well be given.

In order to protect its own banana and sugar industries, Australia had shut out these commodities from Fiji by high tariff rates. Sugar, bananas and copra are Fiji's chief exports and fears were expressed in the council that a heavy blow to the colony's sugar industry would result if Canada, tiring of such a "hit and miss" trading policy were to establish a definite preference system with the West Indies.

In supporting the motion Sir Maynard Hedstrom considered that greater preference should be given Canada for her salmon as most of the Fiji supplies came from there. Canada, he thought, would not be so keen to tax raw products, but might give them preference on copra. Other members spoke in support of the motion and eventually it was decided to appoint a committee to go into the matter of concluding a customs tariff of reciprocal with some part of the Empire, preferably Canada.

Merchants in Auckland, the city that figures most prominently in the Fiji trade, are inclined to view the latest development with some concern. When the matter was brought before the attention of the Auckland Chamber of Commerce, the president immediately called a meeting of his executive, which promptly referred the matter to the department of trade and industry for a report.

Government officers replied that negotiations are now being entered into with Fiji with a view to furthering trade relations between the two countries.

In Fiji, however, popular opinion favors Canada as a more desirable source of trade. As was pointed out in the discussion in the legislative council, New Zealand was a small Dominion and could take only two-thirds of Fiji's sugar production and only one-third of its bananas.

"If we are to have a trade agreement let us have one with a Dominion that could take all." This remark by one of the members is a representative opinion of the business community of Fiji.
