PHONE SERVICE SILENT AN HOUR

Utilities Committee Fail to Make
Report at 6 and Operators
Quit Work.

Promptly at 6 o'clock, according to their threat, the telephone girls ceased operations last evening. At 4 o'clock the Utilities Committee began a meeting to discuss the question brought about by the action of the operators. At 6 o'clock they had not concluded their deliberations, with the result that the strike commenced.

At 6:45 the committee had come to a decision to recommend to the City Council that the Prince Rupert operators be paid at a rate 15 per cent higher than that prevailing in Vancouver. In the meantime rates and schedules are being obtained from the southern city. This action was accepted by the operators and they went back to work after holding up the telephone service for a little less than an hour.

PRIZE ESSAYS ON ACTUAL CONDITIONS IN EACH PROVINCE

OTTAWA, Nov. 26.—In order that the Department of Immigration and Colonization may have authentic accounts of the experience of successful settlers in various parts of Canada, an offer has been made of cash prizes for letters or articles not exceeding two thousand words written by settlers. There are to be three prizes, \$75, \$50 and \$25 given in each of the nine provinces.

This is not a literary contest, the official announcement stating that "literary style, correct spelling, etc., will not be considered essential. Tell your story in your own words."

DELEGATION GOING TO DES MOINES FROM THE B. C. UNIVERSITY

VANCOUVER, Nov. 27.—Eleven representatives of the University of British Columbia are being sent to Des Moines, Iowa, to attend the student conference there from December 30 to January 4. James Mitchell of Prince Rupert is chairman of the convention committee and he will be a member of the delegation.

The University will raise part of the funds required to send the delegates and each delegate is expected to raise the rest. It is expected that the home towns of the students will do something toward sending their special representative.

The conference is being held under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. student volunteer movement. There has not been a gathering of this kind since 1913, when it was held in Kansas City.

It is expected that several members of the University faculty will go with the delegation.

TEN TONS A MONTH

W. Porteous Sloan, managing director of the Drum Lummon Mining Co., was a recent visitor to the city and announced that operations would be extended at the Bella Coola mines next spring. During the past season ten tons of copper, gold and silver ores have been shipped per month.

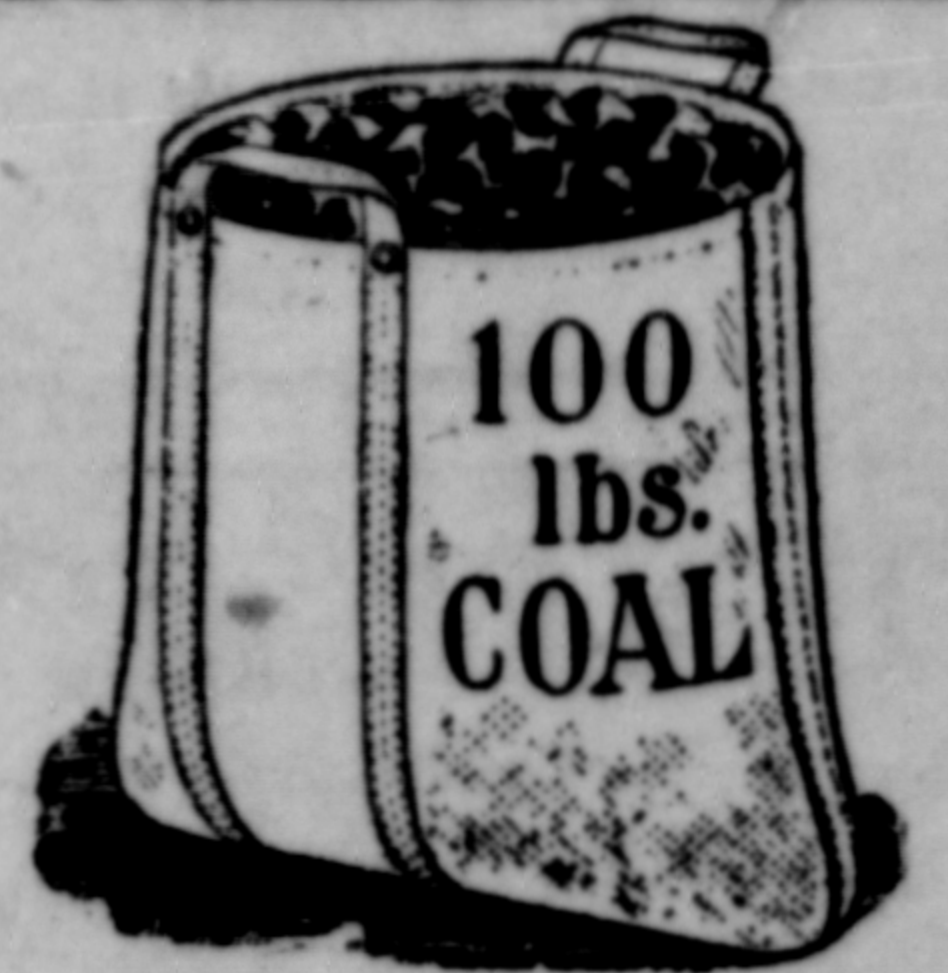
