## Twenty Years Ago

In Prince Rupert

August 20, 1911

A new company, of which H. C. Breckenridge will be president, is being formed to establish a second cold storage plant in Prince Rupert. The company will have a capitalization of \$200,000.

Lionel Crippen has returned to the city from a trip to Mill Bay on the Naas River. He tells of a beautiful flower garden there owned by Henry Doyle.

The 60-foot power vessel Kipling has been purchased by the Granby Co. and will be used as a service boat out of Anyox. The vessel is equipped with a 60 h.p. engine.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway was severely censured by Judge Mabee, chairman of the board of railway commissioners, at the sitting here yesterday for having filled in Cameron Cove. Judgment was reserved on the application of local business interests to have the railway company dig out the fill and instal a bridge instead.

Spy Boy, an English greyhound dog with clairvoyant faculties, has been discovered in England.

Chief Wynn of the provincial police returned yesterday on the steamer Hazelton from Hazelton, bringing four prisoners with him.

There was no meeting of the local Lief Erikson Society last night. Regular meeting will be resumed next month, it is planned.

A. P. Allison, well known Queen Charlotte Island logging operator, was here this morning on the ss. Prince Charles bound from the Islands to Vancouver.

Albert Gigot and family of Anyox, who have been holidaying at Tlell, arrived in the city on the Prince Charles this morning from the Queen Charlotte Islands and will sail tomorrow afternoon on the Prince George for the smelter town. 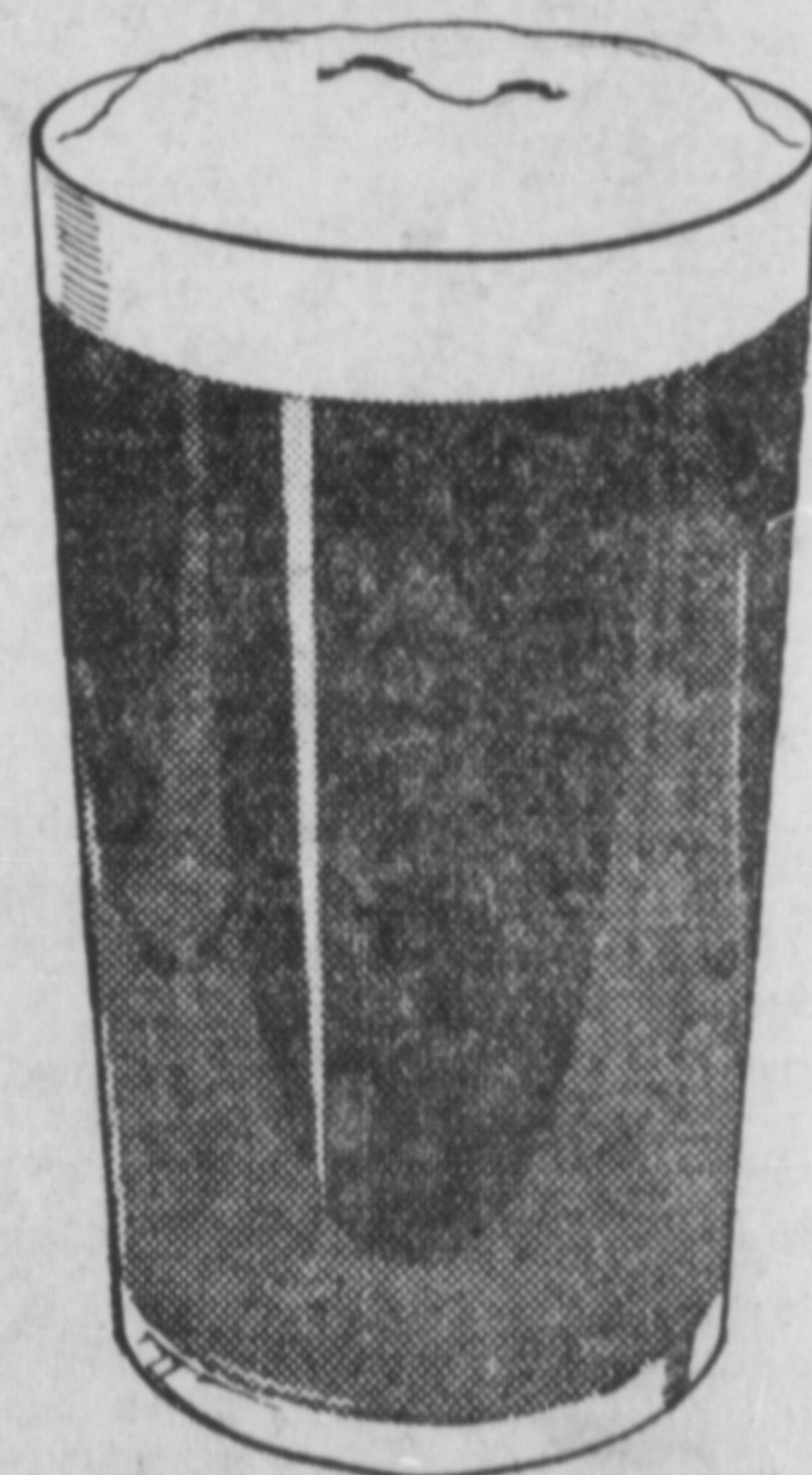
