### Taschereau Government Is Strongly Endorsed In Provincial Contest

Won Seventy Out of Ninety Seats in Legislature—One  
Cabinet Minister and Conservative  
Leader Defeated

MONTREAL, Aug. 25:—The Taschereau government was sustained at the Quebec provincial election yesterday with a slightly increased majority. It was indicated last night that the government would have a good deal more than seventy out of ninety seats in the legislature. All cabinet ministers were re-elected with the exception of Hon. Gordon W. Scott, minister without portfolio.

#### COMMUNITY THREATENED

Residents Prepare to Leave Corbin  
In Crow's Nest Pass Country

CORBIN, August 25:—With forest fires closing in from all directions, residents of this Crow's Nest Pass town were preparing last night to evacuate their homes. Special trains were being sought to convey the refugees to Lethbridge.

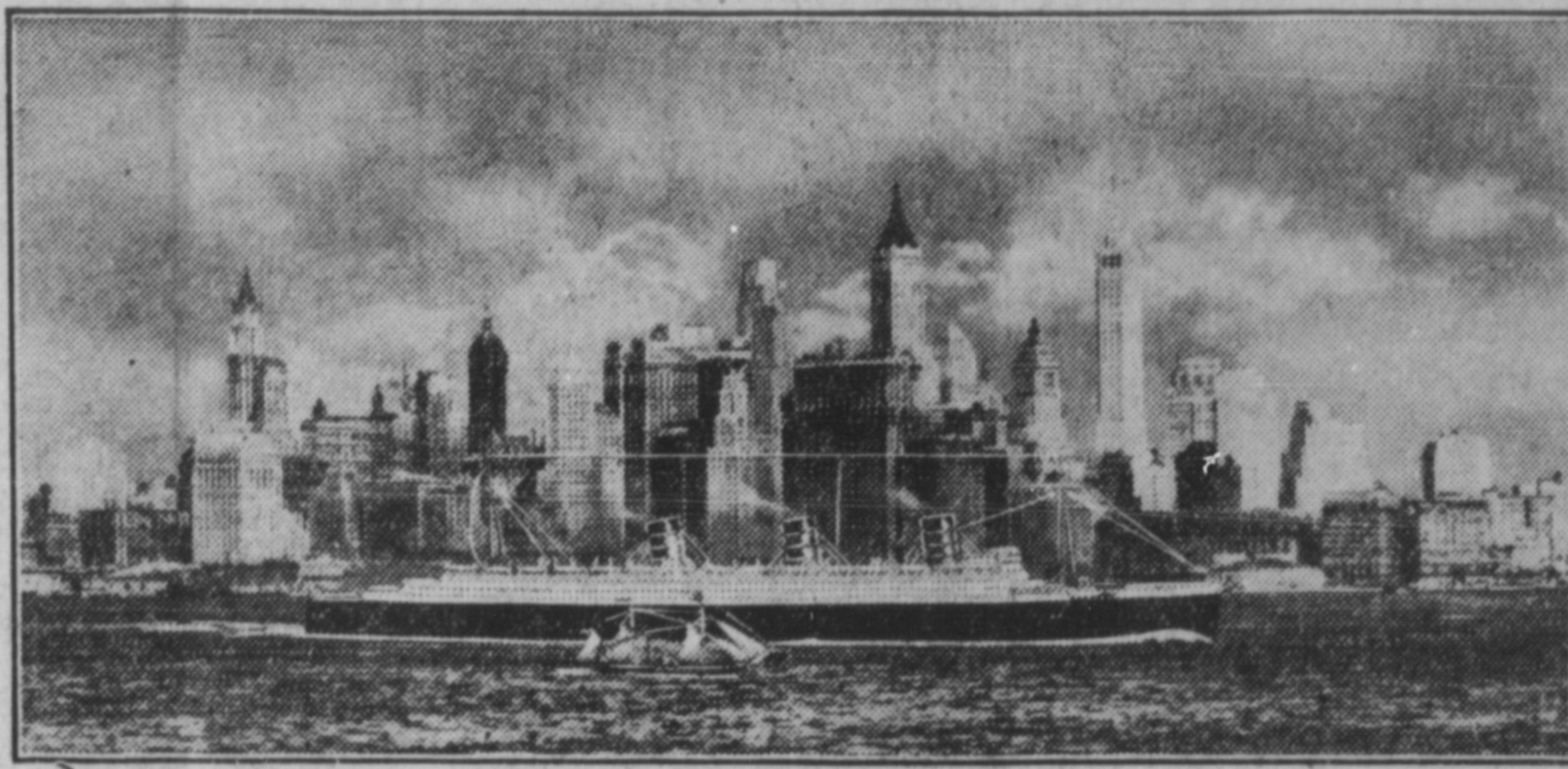
#### FLEET IS ASSISTING

#### LARGEST LINER AGAINST HIGHEST SKYLINE



This is what the giant new Cunarder will look like when she steams up the Hudson River against the skyline of New York on her maiden voyage in 1933. Now being built on the Clyde, "No. 534" (as she is now known) will be the largest vessel afloat, with a length of 1,013 feet, 73,000 tons gross register. She will be launched early next year. The pioneer Cunarder "Britannia" alongside is pictured in the foreground to illustrate the tremendous progress in steamship construction since 1840 when the gallant little 1,154 ton vessel inaugurated the first regular steamship service across the Atlantic.

#### ROME TO 'FRISCO

Italian Aviator is Planning Long  
Flight Via Asia

SEATTLE, Aug. 25:—Plans for a seaplane flight from Rome to San Francisco, eastward around Asia, without seeking non-stop or speed records, were revealed yesterday by Captain Ener Recagno, Italian army flyer. The flight will be made early next year, he said. Captain Recagno, left on a steamer for Alaska after the announcement, stating that he planned to select fuel depots and study flying conditions in the Aleutian Islands.

LONDON, August 25:—Following yesterday's important political developments which featured the resignation of the Labor government and the establishment of a coalition, the Daily Herald, Labor organ, charged that bankers of the United States were dictating internal policies of Great Britain.

### Body of Man and Woman Found In a Burning Port Alberni Home Saturday

Jury Finds That Paddy O'Toole Cut Throat of Mrs. Grace  
Tumlin of Vancouver and Then His Own—  
Jealousy Motive

PORT ALBERNI, Aug. 25:—Verdict of murder and suicide against Paddy O'Toole who, with Mrs. Grace Tumlin of Vancouver, was found dead in O'Toole's burning home here Saturday was returned last night by the coroner's jury. The jury found that O'Toole, after murdering the woman but cutting her throat, took his own life by the same means. Jealousy is believed to have been the motive for the tragedy.

#### OIL PRICE JUMP DUE

Closing Down of Fields Is Having  
Effect

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Aug. 25:—State officials and oil leaders predict that within 24 hours crude oil would climb to one dollar a barrel, almost double its recent figure and about seventy-five cents higher than when Governor William H. ("Alfalfa Bill") Murray shut down the wells and stopped production under martial law. Refiners did not have enough crude oil to last three days. With East Texas and all flush fields in Oklahoma closed down, observers said the refiners would meet the one dollar price set. Producers said if the price went up to one dollar, they would give all credit to Governor Murray, governor in Oklahoma, and Ross E. Sterling in Texas.

#### EDISON NOT SO WELL NOW

Famous Inventor Has Relapse Following  
Recovery

WEST ORANGE, N.J., Aug. 25:—Charles Edison, son of Thomas A. Edison, the inventor, said yesterday that his father had not felt so well for the past two or three days, but he attributed this to a relapse due to Edison's too speedy recovery from his recent collapse.

#### WAR UPON GANGSTERS

Monster Mass Meeting of Citizens  
Determines to Rid New York  
of Gangsters

NEW YORK, Aug. 25:—At a huge mass meeting last night in Madison Square Garden, New York citizens declared war to the death upon gunmen, racketeers and bootleggers. It was one of the great outbreaks of public indignation in the history of the city, having resulted from the incident on Saturday when six persons were killed in a pitched battle on downtown streets.

Vice-president Charles Curtis and Governor Frank Roosevelt were among those who were represented at the meeting, both pledging their support to the movement for the eradication of gangster activities in the city.

### FOLK QUIT FIRE TOWN

Flames Drive 700 Residents Out of  
Corbin in Crow's Nest Pass

#### None Can Enter

Railway Property is Destroyed at  
Nearby Section Point

FERNIE, August 25—Seven hundred inhabitants of Corbin, coal mining town, 40 miles from here, evacuated the town last evening when a forest fire borne on a hurricane swept the town.

Wye, a section point about a mile north of the main town, consisting of a number of shacks and tents and a railway roundhouse, was destroyed.

The main town was given a reprieve when the wind lessened but it was still in peril and so smoke-laden that none can enter.

Women and children are encamped six miles from the danger zone at Cold Spring while men and boys are enlisted to fight the flames.

### FLYERS IN NEW YORK

Boardman and Polando Back After  
Record Breaking Flight to  
Istanbul

NEW YORK, August 25—Russell Boardman and John Polando, who stirred the world of aviation a few weeks ago with their fine non-stop flight from New York to Istanbul, Turkey, slipped quietly into New York yesterday, bringing their famous Bellanca plane "Capt Cod" on with them on the same steamer.

Board and Polando were to fly today to their home town of Boston where a great reception awaited them.

Customs officers demanded that Boardman and Polando should pay duty on diamond emblems which were presented to the two flyers by the Turkish Air Club after their arrival at Istanbul.
