HEALTH OF CHILDREN

Hospital Board Offers to Co-operate in Matter of Giving Free Treatment to Needy

Indicating its willingness to provide accommodation free for deserving cases, the hospital board at last night's meeting on motion of W. M. Brown, and Ald. S. D. Macdonald, passed a resolution offering co-operation in a movement designed to rectify the health situation among the school children as revealed in the recent report to the school board of Dr. R. G. Large, medical inspector of schools. The resolution also authorized the president of the board to appoint a representative of the board on a committee of organizations to go into the matter if such committee is formed.

Mr. Brown explained that the matter, which appeared to be alarming, had been taken up by the Trades & Labor Council which had made the proposal that various organizations, such as the city council, school board, hospital board and medical and dental associations co-operate in considering and, if possible, taking steps to rectify the situation. Many parents were unable at present to finance such an operation as removal of tonsils, etc. and it was felt that some assistance should be given in such cases. Such ailments, undoubtedly, affected the work of children in schools.

Ald. Macdonald thought that the hospital board should offer its co-operation as far as possible such as volunteering to provide free hospital accommodation. The other organizations could give assistance in other ways.

Mr. Brown and Ald. Macdonald moved and seconded a motion that the board go on record as being willing to assist in the matter and

Interference Eliminated

W. M. Brown, chairman of the finance committee, announced at the meeting of the hospital board last night that, at the recommendation of Felix Batt, local radio inspector, condensers had been installed on the hospital ward buzzer system with a view to eliminating radio interference occasioned thereby. The cost of making the installation had been but \$2.25.

Mr. Brown also reported that a filter had been placed in the water condenser in the operating room.

that the president be authorized to appoint a representative to a central committee should it be decided to form one.

G. V. Wilkinson thought that possible loss of revenue should not be considered as against the improvement of the children's health. There were some cases, however, which might not be so serious as might appear. Malnutrition had, for instance, been recorded in a number of cases of underweight.

Miss Jean Harrison, R. N., lady superintendent, did not think the report was half as alarming as might appear.

How many and what times children could be accommodated would have to depend, it was pointed out, on the capacity available at various times for such cases. It was pointed out that the usual charge for such cases as tonsil removal was \$12.50.
