

## DEATH OF CARDINAL

His Eminence Felix Raymond Marie Rouleau Passes Away on Sunday

WAS HURT LAST FALL

Was Third Cardinal to be Appointed in Canada-Born in Quebee

QUEBEC, June 1:-Cardinal Raymond Rouleau, Canada's third Cardinal of the Roman Catholic Church, died on Sunday. He had been in ill-health since last summer when he was seriously injured in an automobile accident. He was sixty years old and a native of Quebec.

Like his predecessor, Cardinal Begin, Cardinal Felix Raymond Marie Rouleau was a son of a farmer and his early years were spent in the beautiful country side near the St. Lawrence at Isie Verte. His parents were Felix Rouleau and his wife. Marie Irvine, and he was born on April 6, 1866. As a little boy he gave promise of being a remarkable scholar. He attracted the attention of Canon Rouleau of Rimouski, his uncle, who undertook to superintend his education when the lad was 16 years old.

Naturally young Rouleau gravitated towards the church and after taking the classical course at Rimouski seminary he joined the Dominican Order at St. Hyacinthe in 1886. Six years later he was ordained priest at one of the chief Dominican establishments in Cornition when he was chosen Prior of the Dominican Order in Canada throughout Canada for his ser-
