SCOTS' ANNUAL BALL BIGGEST SUCCESS YET

Arrangements Were in Perfect
Shape for St. Andrew's Most
Successful Annual Ball.

The annual ball held under the auspices of the St. Andrew's Society was held in their ball-room last night. A very large assemblage gathered there for the affair and certainly no one went away disappointed with the quality or zest of the entertainment. The crowd thronging the hall was not confined to Scots, but the event was representative of the city. There was a gathering of 400 persons and expressions of pleasure were heard on every hand.

The St. Andrew's Society has always had the reputation of making its entertainments go with a swing and last evening was no exception to this rule. A program was carried out consisting of such old favorites as the lancers, quadrilles and Highland schottisches, as well as modern fox trots, one steps and waltzes. The Highland dances were played in characteristic manner by the pipes and there were even a few "kilties" noted in the assemblage. Though many of the guests present were not initiated into the intricacies of the Scottish characteristic dances still watching them was probably as great a pleasure as the actual dancing, as there were many who had not forgotten a single step and went through the figures gracefully and faultlessly.

Decorations.

The floor was in excellent condition and the hall was beautifully decorated. The predominating feature in the scheme of adornment was the white diagonal cross of St. Andrew on the blue field which was combined with the colors of the Union Jack. All the hangings were in the blue and white colors of the order. The music was provided by Harvey's Orchestra which was augmented by James Lee and D. M. Peyton of the St. Andrew's Society orchestra. Several new numbers were played and the excellence of the music was the cause of considerable favorable comment.

Five sittings were required to accommodate the dancers at the supper tables and the fact that the attendance was much greater than the most hopeful of the committee had anticipated made it difficult to cater for all. The supper was put up in a most tempting and appetizing manner.

The committee having arrangements in hand must be gratified with the success scored and the guests, one and all, were delighted with the entertainment. This ball was a rival for any of the previous big annual events held by the society. S. D. Macdonald, president of the society, acted very capably as floor manager, with W. A.
