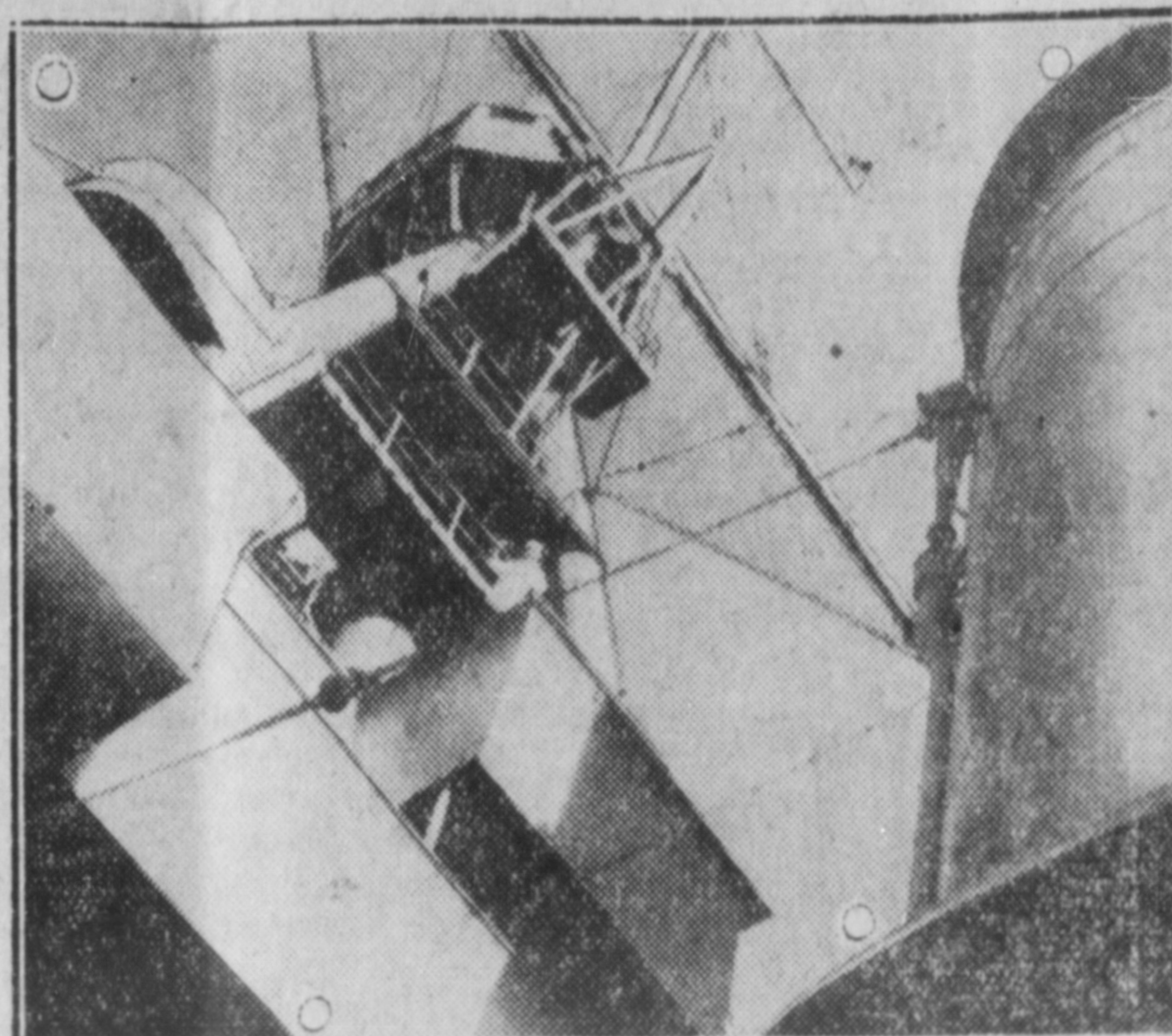

LONG TRIP IS PLANNED

C.P.R. Steamer to be Here Next Week in Course of Special British Columbia and Alaska Cruise

Next week the popular C.P.R. steamer Princess Alice, in command of Capt. S. K. Gray, will be withdrawn temporarily from the regular Alaska service to make a special cruise of thirteen days duration in British Columbia and Alaska coast waters. The vessel has already been booked up with a capacity list of over two hundred passengers for the cruise.

Leaving Vancouver early Tuesday evening next week, the ss. Princess Alice will cruise up Burke Channel past Bella Coola and make its first stop at Ocean Falls. It will then come on here and due to arrive in Prince Rupert at 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon, leaving at 11 o'clock that evening for Ketchikan. After the stop at Ketchikan, the ship will cruise through Behm Channel, which is the body of water back of Revilla Gidedo Island, on which Ketchikan is located, then proceeding to Taku River Glacier, Juneau and Skagway.

After a stay of considerable length at Skagway, the vessel will turn south again and will make calls at Sitka, Wrangell, Ketchikan, Stewart and Anyox. No call is scheduled for Prince Rupert southbound but the vessel will stop at Butedale, cruise up Gardner Canal and stop at Alert Bay and Powell River before ending the voyage at Vancouver.

On conclusion of this special voyage, the Princess Alice will come back to the Alaska run, replacing the steamer Princess Charlotte for the remainder of the summer schedule.

'Spirit' Subject Science Lesson Sermon Sunday
