RECENT DEVELOPMENTS IN MINING IN THE BULKLEY VALLEY DISTRICT

(Continued from page one)

M. Campbell is in charge of development work. During the season a large number of open cuts have been made on five different veins and this work is still proceeding. A new camp has been built just below the high plateau on which these showings occur and is the highest mining camp in this part of the province.

Silver King Mine at the head of Driftwood Creek in the Babine Range has produced some sensational native silver specimens in recent work. These and a choice specimen of fine-grained galena from a new surface cut are now on display in the local Chamber of Mines. Development is still being conducted on these properties for Omineca Silver King Mines Ltd., the present owner.

Babine Victoria or Lorraine property has also had some new work done, though the owners of this are very lacking in funds.

Rainbow Group, on the Bulkley Valley slope of the Babine Range close to the Driftwood Creek motor road and with fourteen miles of Smifthers, has had further development work carried out by the local syndicate owning it. This has achieved noteworthy results, opening up new silver-copper ores not hitherto exposed and adding to the promise of this property. Jas. Wright is the head of the local syndicate.

The Cronin or Babine Bonanza Mine goes steadily on with blocking out further silver-lead-zinc ores and preparing for the expansion sure to come to this proven mine when metal prices warrant the large expenditure that will be required to overcome its transportation problem and equip the mine for operation. In July some of the principals of the company—Babine Bonanza Mining and Milling Co. Ltd. (which is the company of the late Jas. Cronin) visited the property and they are expected to pay a further visit in the near future to inspect recent work and to plan for the future. Good results are reported from recent development.

Individual prospectors in the Milk Creek Section, Telkwa River, have been working in a small way opening up several high-grade and promising silver-lead showings. Without adequate capital they cannot do much, however great the promise of their showings.

SPORT NOTES

A little bit of bunting, found recently when a board-walk in Fort William was torn up, brought back memories of the days when lacrosse held sway at the lake-head. When the walk was renewed at the corner of Finlayson and McMur-ray streets, a badge was discovered where it had lain for 29 years. Wonderfully well preserved, the badge bore the wording—"1902 Dominion Day—Kaministiquia Lacrosse Club." Old timers began recalling the famous lacrosse club of that year on whose roster were many celebrities of the day, including Hon. R. J. Manion, Dominion minister of railways and canals who wielded a tricky stick at cover point, E. C. Little, prominent athlete of the time, said the badge was one of many sold to gain financial support for the club, Geo. A. MacDonald, retired merchant and now one of Canada's greatest

curling exponents, was field captain of the famous team. Of all the hundreds of ball teams in Canada, Winnipeg has what is perhaps the most unique—a one-armed brigade. Organized five years ago by a number of war veterans, it was made an iron-clad rule that no player could perform for the "Amputations" team unless he had lost an arm overseas. Winning and losing games all over the province—mostly winning—the team became famous, locally. But the strict rule was broken. They took in Jack Peppin, who qualified in every way except that he had two arms. But Jack had only one leg. In 1927 the most handicapped ball team in Canada played 46 games and won 43 of them. The lineup is: W. Farrell, E. Bailey, B. Shipman, H. Davis, Bill Wheeler, J. R. McDougall, W. Woods, Roy Sanderson, Jack Peppin and L. Johnson.

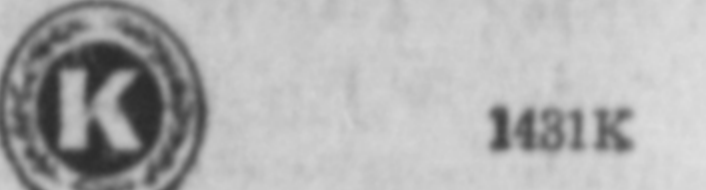
