Sweepstake Measure Denounced By Dr. F. W. Kerr

Trenchant criticism of Senator George H. Barnard, Victoria, and his bill to legalize the conducting of sweepstake lotteries in Canada was voiced by Rev. F. W. Kerr, D.D., formerly of Prince Rupert, in Knox United Church, Winnipeg, recently. Dr. Kerr was preaching on "Sweepstakes, Lotteries and Hospitals."

Senator Barnard's contention that "people are going to gamble anyway, so why not make capital out of it," would lead to the same situation as exists at Reno, Nev., claimed the preacher. Reno, he pointed out, contains many palatial gambling houses, in addition to many other gambling devices which meet the eye almost everywhere.

Contending that the Canadian Senate was not as active as it should be, and that he could not recall it having ever introduced an original bill of a constructive nature, Dr. Kerr said, that in the event of the senator's bill receiving sanction, every true Canadian would rejoice at the dissolving of the senate. It was appalling that such action should be taken by a member of the senate to legalize such a thing as lotteries which were contrary to the laws of Can-

Condemning the principle of hospital sweepstakes, Dr. Kerr said he was in accord with certain articles from which he quoted declaring that the hospitals were used on such occasions only as a means of placating public opinion. Of the eight million dollars corlected in the last Irish hospitals'
