## SPORT CHAT

While it has been tentatively arranged that the winner of Thursday night's main event between Henry Deeth and Billy Bagshaw should have a return match with Benny Wendle, some of the local fans think that a Bagshaw-Nine Gurvich engagement might now go well. Probably the most important matter that will come up at the next annual meeting of the A.A.U. of C. at Winnipeg on December 3, 4 and 5 will be the plan of national registration. In the past individual associations and provincial bodies have issued cards at, in most cases, 25¢ a head, the cards being charged to them by the National Union at 5¢ a head. The new registration law which has been compiled by W. H. Kilby of Montreal, who is chairman of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee of the Union, has been submitted to the governors. It will be proposed by him at the annual meeting, seconded by B. J. Palin. For many years the question of universal registration has been discussed at annual conventions of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, and there are several reasons in favor of its adoption.

Aldermen of Moncton, N.B., may now pursue their deliberations without fear of interruption by the thud of gloves and the roars of fandom. Moncton's youths who aspire to eminence under Queensberry rules must work out their careers against another background. In brief, boxing has been banned from the city hall. Informed that the city received a fee of ten dollars on each occasion that scheduled fights were held in the city building, Alderman Steeves expressed a view that the community had better get along without this extra revenue and allow the council to work in peace. When bouts were in progress, he said, it was almost impossible for the civic body to carry on its duties because of the noise made outside by a number of youngsters who frequented the bouts and "should be at home studying next day's lessons." A motion to ban boxing from the city hall was thereupon carried by the casting vote of the chairman.

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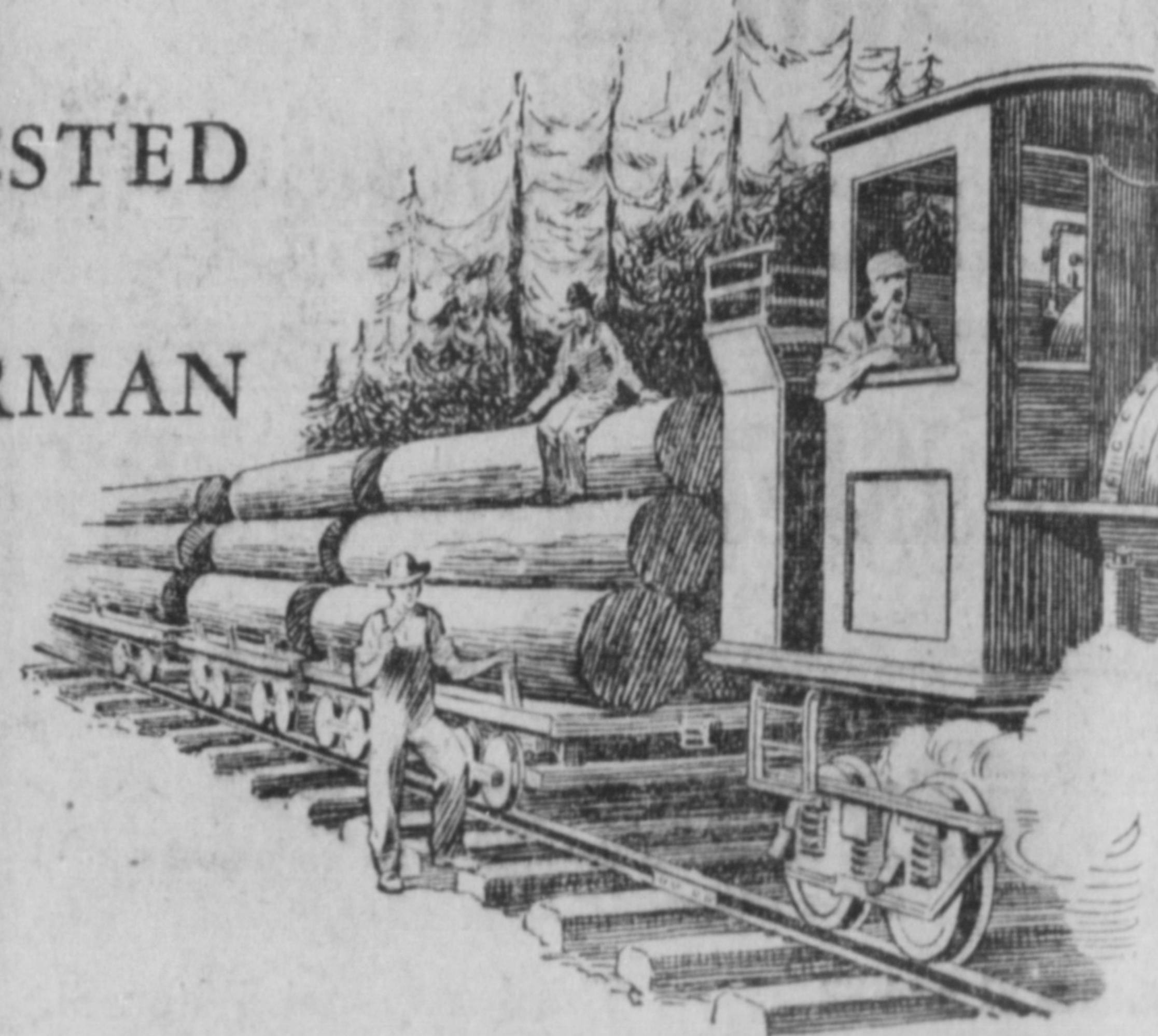
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
