SHIP FOUNDERS WITH CREW ABOARD

BRITISH ELECTION ACCLAMATIONS FAVOR GOVERNMENT

Japanese Freighter Yonan Maru Presumed to Have Gone Down in Pacific With Loss of All Hands

BROKE DOWN AT SEATTLE

Adolph Linden Sheds Tears as Prosecuting Attorney Examines Him

SEATTLE, Oct. 17.—Adolph Linden, former president of the Puget Sound Savings & Loan Co., burst into tears here when the prosecuting attorney demanded that he explain his motives in having transferred hundreds of thousands of dollars of funds of the savings and loan company to a radio broadcasting company.

GRADING ORDERED

Work Between Horseshoe Bay and Howe Sound May Form Part of P.G.E.

VICTORIA, Oct. 17.—The provincial government has ordered an immediate start on the construction of a grade from Horseshoe Bay to Howe Sound. The grade could be used either as a highway or in connection with the completion of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway from Squamish to North Vancouver.

Handicraft Use Urged

B. K. Sandwell Urges Vancouver Women to Turn Away From Machine-Made Goods

VANCOUVER, Oct. 17.—Speaking before the Women's Canadian Club here, B. K. Sandwell of Ottawa urged the advisability of transferring at least part of home consumption from machine made products to handicraft work. More employment would thus be afforded and there would be an individuality and personal charm in the hand made article, particularly clothes, that the manufactured article could never possess.

FIFTY-EIGHT YEARS IS AVERAGE SPAN OF PRESENT MAN'S LIFE

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—The average lifetime of man is now 58 years, it has been revealed before the American College of Surgeons here. This is a good deal longer than half a century ago. Fear and worry reduce lifetime materially, it is declared.

Three Rescue Ships Unable to Find Any Trace Other Than Part of Deckload of Lumber—Between Forty and Fifty Men Were on Board

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 17.—The Japanese freighter Yonan Maru, which sent out distress signals on Thursday night saying that she was sinking and pleading for immediate assistance, was given up for lost with her crew of between forty and fifty men today after the only trace of the vessel found by three searching ships was part of the deckload of logs.

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—Two more theatres were bombed with little damage yesterday as the dispute between theatre owners and operators continued with little sign of settlement.

Bluenose Is Far Superior In Sailing Today But Was Unable to Finish in Time

HALIFAX, N.S., Oct. 17.—The Bluenose, Canadian defender of the International Fishermen's Trophy, proved her superiority in all points of sailing over the Gertrude L. Thebaud, United States challenger, under conditions prevailing today but was unable to finish the race within the time limit of six hours. The Thebaud was four miles behind. The race will be resailed on Monday.

National Government Takes Fifty-Nine Seats Without Fight; More Than Expected

LONDON, Oct. 17.—Completed returns of the nominations yesterday for the British general election showed 47 Conservatives, 12 Liberal Nationalists and six Laborites elected by acclamation. The Nationalist government had expected to win only forty seats by acclamation but it actually has nineteen more than that to its credit.

There will be polling in 551 seats on October 27.

Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Conservative leader, was the only one of the party chieftains to receive acclamation. He will be free to take an active part in the campaign in various parts of the country. Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald; Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George, Free Trade Liberal chief; Rt. Hon. Arthur Henderson, Labor and Opposition leader; Sir Herbert Samuel, head of the Liberal Nationalists, and Sir John Simon, leader of the Liberal protectionists, all have opposition.

RAILWAY ATTACKED

C. N. R. Held Responsible For Distress Among Coal Miners

VANCOUVER, Oct. 17.—At the closing session here yesterday of the convention of the American Federation of Labor, a shot was taken at the Canadian National Railways. One of the speakers declared that the railway company was responsible for distress among United States and Canadian coal miners through getting coal at less than cost. The Canadian National owns coal mines in Ohio, it was asserted.

VANCOUVER ON MONDAY

Series of Whaler Races Will Be One of Features of Destroyer's Visit

The commanding officer of Prince Rupert company, Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve, is in receipt of advice that H.M.C.S. Vancouver, which is on a coast cruise, will arrive in Prince Rupert harbor about 1:30 p.m. Monday.

During the afternoon several whaler races will be pulled between crews from the destroyer.

The destroyer has also challenged the local unit R.C.N.V.R. to a whaler race at 3:45 p.m. Monday, and as the Vancouver's crew has beaten that of the Skeena, the local boys are expecting to have a tough fight. The local crew will be the same as that which will pull against H.M.C.S. Skeena in the final race for the Burns Challenge Cup during that vessel's visit here the last week in October and will be composed as follows: C. P. O. Young (coxswain), J. Macfie (stroke), J. Westman, S. White, R. Pitcher and J. Freidham.

It will be remembered that the Skeena and R.C.N.V.R. have each won one race so the final for the cup should be an interesting contest. Both crews are practicing at every available opportunity, the local unit, however, having to be content with getting their training during the evening.

Nomination Day Is His Birthday

Rt. Hon. Austen Chamberlain's Daughter Gives Him Black Cat to Bring Him Luck

LONDON, Oct. 17.—Rt. Hon. Austen Chamberlain, First Lord of the Admiralty in the National Government, observed his sixty-eighth birthday yesterday by filing his general election nomination papers in West Birmingham. His daughter made him the gift of a black cat to "bring him luck."

BRIDGE IS SET BACK

Second Narrows Span Company Not to Accept Offer of Steel Company

VANCOUVER, Oct. 17.—Prospects of reopening of the Second Narrows bridge received another setback yesterday when it was revealed that the Burrard Bridge Co. could not accept the offer of the Pacific Steel Co. to finance the work, taking company bonds in payment. The bridge company has no authority to issue debentures in excess of \$50,000.

Georgia River Gold Stock Is Active Friday
