ough to warrant action to be taken by liberty-loving people. A Japanese must eat where the contractor dictates, he must operate two men per boat when it is decidedly more advantageous to operate one, the fisherman being compelled to hire another Japanese, termed a boat puller, and licenced as such. He is also compelled to purchase or hire a new net each season, an expense fisherman. In addition to this, all fish the Japanese fishermen catch must be sold to the cannery where he is attached and at no other

It is pointed out that at present ments were served. practically 80% of the Japanese employed under the system come from Southern British Columbia and at the close of the season they take their earnings south. The fishermen of this district spend their money here.
