E. Parlow Makes Suggestion to Chamber of Commerce Which Will Be Followed Up

At the insance of A. E. Parlow, district forester, the Chamber of Commerce last night decided to make a move with the object of securing the establishment of an aquarium in the city, possibly at the Fisheries Experimental Station. As a first step, John Dybhavn, who is a member of the Biological Board, promised to find out if the ground floor at the old building could be secured for museum and aquarium purposes.

In introducing the subject Mr. Parlow mentioned that an aquarium would be a great attraction to tourists and also it would have great educational value, especially for the children of the city. 
