



## BASKETBALL LAST NIGHT

Large Crowd Witnessed Another Fine Set of Games

Another large and enthusiastic audience witnessed the second series of games in the first half of the basketball schedule. All four games were evenly contested and the fans voiced their appreciation of many dazzling plays in a manner that augurs well for the game this season. Much favorable comment was also heard in respect of the excellent heating conditions which prevail in the building. It is hoped that, with such comfort for the spectators and with teams which seem to be so evenly matched, the basketball association will be supported in its effort to foster the game in the city this winter.

Already it has been noticed that the preliminary junior games are providing keen competition and, even though time limitations place them at an hour that is rather difficult, these games are well worth

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seeing. Last night the Scouts and Japanese made their initial appearance. On paper it looked as though the Japanese would walk off the floor easy winners. But how those Scouts played! The deadly shooting of Santerbane, Wilson and Calderoni took all the fight out of the Japanese who left the floor on the short end of a 34-5 score. However, this score does not indicate the play which was in reality fast and hotly contested. Give those Japanese a little more shooting, and let the Scouts "be prepared" for a reversal, mayhap. The Tuxis-High School game, which followed, was the best exhibition of basketball during the evening. The Tuxis boys, who flashed so brilliantly against Merchants on Tuesday, were not so successful with High last night. They just couldn't seem to locate that elusive basket. Morrison, Thurber and Nakamoto potted at it from all angles but they could not sink a large enough percentage to pull out a win. High, on the other hand, especially in the first half, couldn't miss. Of Unger's first five shots, three went in during the first few minutes of play giving High a 6-0 lead that it was able to hold throughout. Unger's shooting was deadly and, during the first half, he gave High five baskets. Running him a close second was Wingham who, although amassing less points, was probably more spectacular. Morrison, however, who is usually a consistent marksman, was away off and only managed to locate twice in the first half. Nakamoto, on the other hand, was the most useful Tuxis player. To watch this boy work is a treat for any basketball enthusiast. His brilliant dribbling, fake passing and shooting, and fine team play stamp him as the Tuxis pivot. After piling up a comfortable lead in the first half, High played their subs, Ross and Tobey for half the game, while Vance, Wingham, Walters and Forbes took turns at warming the bench. 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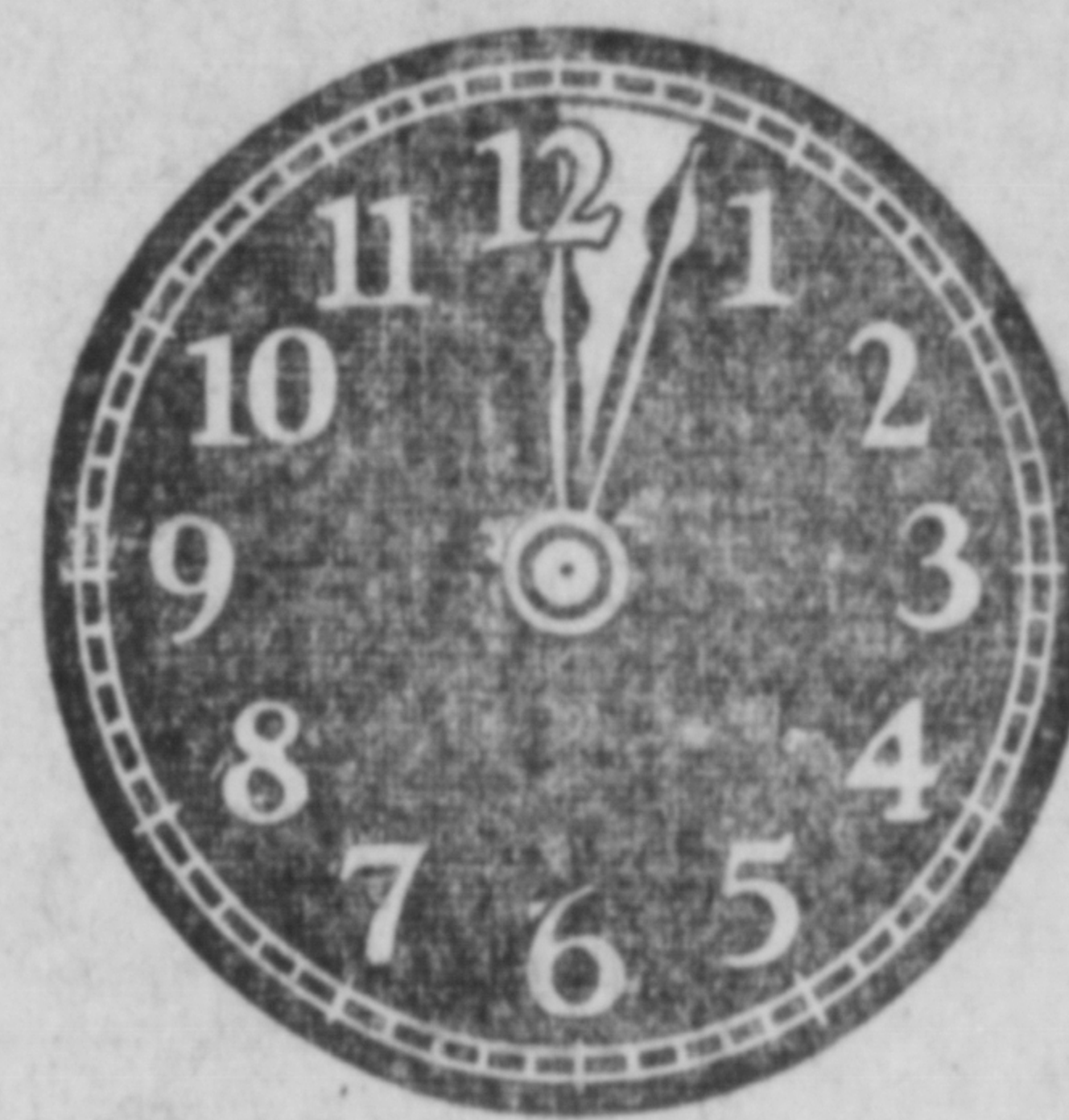
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
