PRINCE GEORGE, May 26:-After a trial extending over several days, Michael Sowry of Hythe, Alta., was found guilty by a jury at the Supreme Court Assizes here on the charge of murdering Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Babchuk in a lonely cabin in the Fort St. John district last August, and was sentenced to be hanged by Mr. Justice W. A. Mac-

Direct Defence

In opening the case for the defence Saturday morning, J. A. Russell, defence counsel, stated that the defence would be a short direct one, depending mainly upon the statements made by the accused from the witness box.

Sowry then entered the box. He said he was a Ukrainian, 53 years of age, had been in Canada 34 years and married 33 years. By trade he was a carpenter and farmer. He had first gone to Hythe in May, 1929 and had a homestead at Keg River.
