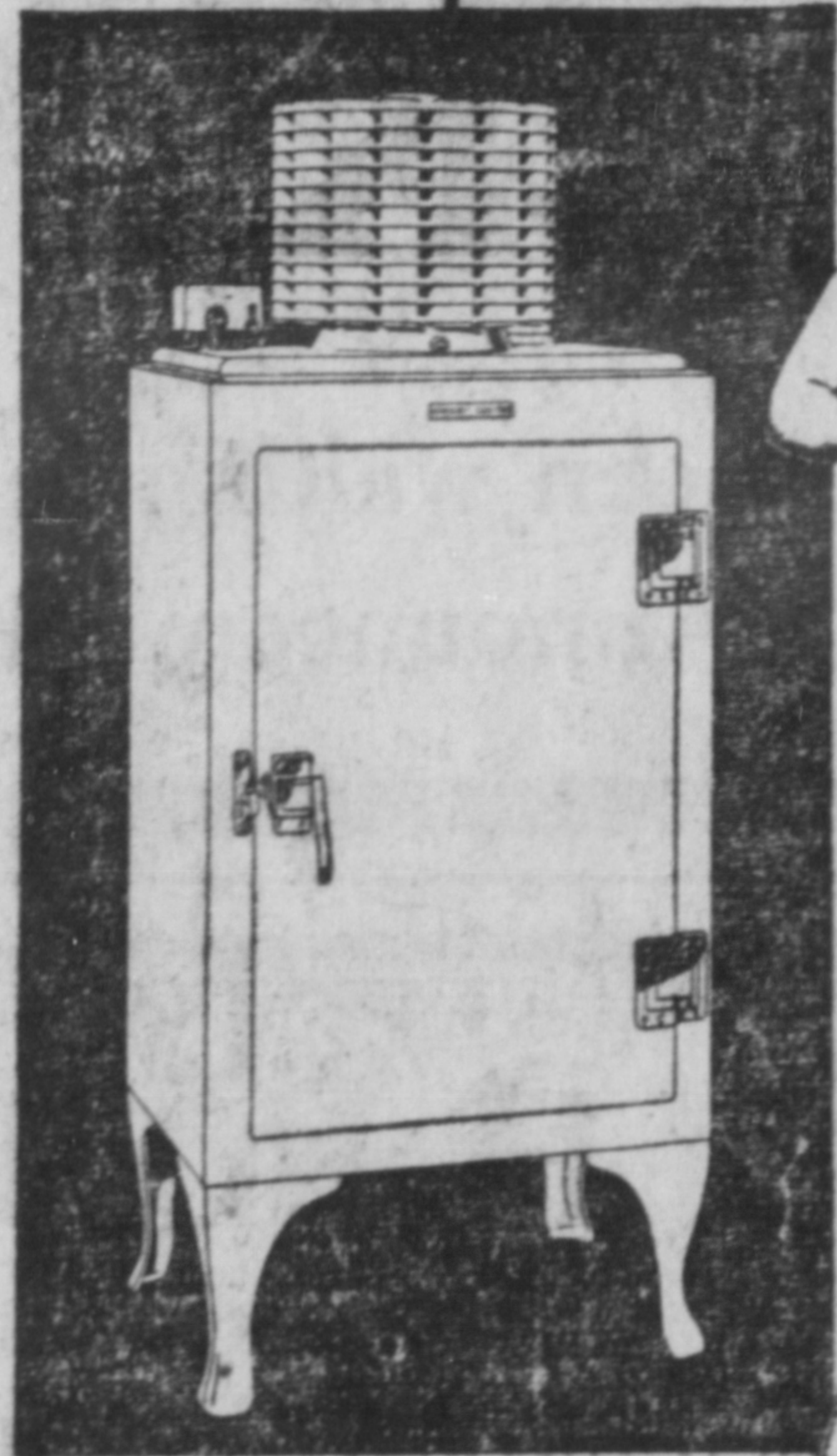

Ted Smith's team to bat. Batteries for Stinech team: Pitcher, Stinech, catcher, Church. Arney hits two-bagger to bank and R. Tobey singles to first. Ted Smith flies out to Emmelman. Dominato singles, scoring Arney. Kanaya thrown out on first, but R. Tobey scores. Green flies out to Stinech.

Second inning: Stinech's team to bat. H. Fisher flies out to Kanaya. Bussanich thrown out on first. Dominato to MacRae. Church flies out to Dominato.

Ted Smith's team to bat. MacRae flies out to Kirkendall. Murray singles. Postulo flies out to Stinech. Murray tries to score on Arney's single but is caught on home by Church.

Third inning: Stinech to bat. Kirkendall fouls out to Smith. Marshall flies out to Murray in left field. Welle is forced out on second by Obachina's single.

Ted Smith to bat: Tobey singles and Smith singles, forcing Tobey out on second. Stinech walks Dominato. Kanaya safe at first on Church's overthrow, and Smith scores. Green walks, and MacRae singles, scoring Dominato. With bags full, Murray singles and Kanaya forced out on home. Postulo flies out to Stinech.

Fourth inning: Stinech to bat. Stinech singles. Emmelman flies out to Murray. Fisher thrown out on first and Stinech scores on Bussanich's single. Kirkendall flies out to Green, right field.

Smith to bat. Arney safe on first on Stinech's fumble. Tobey flies out to Bussanich and a double play is made when Arney is caught on first. Smith singles. Dominato strikes out.

Fifth inning: Stinech to bat. Church flies out to Green in centre field. Marshall flies out to Kanaya. Welle flies out to Tobey.

Batteries remained the same. Score 1-4.
