Mahatma Gandhi Asks For Interview With Viceroy of India on Question

LONDON, Feb. 16:-Mahatma Gandhi, leader of the Indian Nationalist party, is still hopeful that an amicable agreement may be reached between India and Britain for the complete independence of the former country. He has asked Lord Irwin, the viceroy, for a frank interview in which to discuss the question.

Gandhi is not satisfied with the understanding reached at the recent round table conference in London, holding that India is far from given independence by that agree-

NEW DELHI, India, Feb. 16:-The Twenty-Seven Carloads of Wheat viceroy, Lord Irwin, said today that the government is ready to grant general amnesty to political prisoners in India and to consider the withdrawal of the present laws against All-India Congress party activities if Mahatma Gandhi will call off the civil disobedience campaign and give evidence of a change of heart toward the government.
